Welcome

Commission Chairman Reckhow welcomed everyone to the joint meeting of the Board of County Commissioners and Durham Public Schools Board of Education. She noted progress made by the Board and DPS, such as the purchase of the Lakewood YMCA, which was announced at the press conference held prior to today's meeting. Lakewood YMCA would be an asset to the Durham neighborhood.

School Board Chairman Forte-Brown praised the collaborative relationship between the Board of County Commissioners and DPS Board of Education. She echoed Chairman Reckhow's comments regarding Lakewood.

School Construction Projects Update

School Board Chairman Forte-Brown introduced Hugh Osteen, Assistant Superintendent of Operational Services, to present the update on Durham Public Schools' construction projects.

Mr. Osteen addressed questions by the Board of County Commissioners and Board of Education throughout his presentation.

Chairman Reckhow asked Mr. Osteen to explain in an email to the County Manager the difficulty with businesses obtaining permits for the upcoming construction projects.

Carol Hammett, Assistant County Attorney, replied to Chairman Reckhow's question regarding the number of hours spent working with DPS to avoid paying sales tax on property. She stated that County Attorney staff routinely spends an average of 10 hours per project providing contract management for DPS projects. Approximately 180 hours of services have been provided in the last year.

Chairman Reckhow requested that staff relay to the Durham Delegation the countless hours that County and DPS staffs have dedicated to the sales tax process for construction projects. The process involves DPS deeding property to the County and performing work under the County's name through DPS process. At the end of the project, the land is transferred back to DPS to avoid paying sales tax.

Mr. Martin responded to Chairman Reckhow that the School Board Association has the sales tax issue on its priority list for legislative action.

Chairman Reckhow suggested that the School Board Association consider notifying citizens of the sales tax issue in a high-profiled manner.

Chairman Forte-Brown concurred with Chairman Reckhow that the Association should be more aggressive when notifying the public.

Chairman Reckhow suggested that DPS collaborate with Wake County regarding the sales tax issue.

Mr. Schewel noted that sales tax is paid when school supplies such as books are purchased.

Mr. Osteen and Dr. Harris responded to the following questions by the Board of County Commissioners:

- Is Holton School on schedule for its projected completion date? (Vice-Chairman Page)
 - Yes, it is anticipated to be completed in summer 2009.
- How to enhance the popularity of other middle schools to the popularity level of Rogers-Herr Middle School; is there a plan to improve these schools? (Vice-Chairman Page)
 - Yes, the plan is to redesign the schools to improve their attractiveness, which in turn may increase their popularity among parents and students. E.K. Powe and Y.E. Elementary Schools are addressed in the 2007 Bond, totaling \$11 million.
- What is the long-term plan for Creekside Elementary School? (Vice-Chairman Page)
 - O Demographers will be working with DPS during the summer and fall to compose a comprehensive plan to observe student projections over multiple years. That should provide better information for DPS to make long-range decisions regarding where and how quick a school should be built. Some areas would have to be redistricted as new schools are built.

- Is Parkwood Elementary School at full capacity? (Vice-Chairman Page)
 - Yes, it is at capacity.
- When issues arise in regards to projects to occur from the 2003 bonds, how will the issues be addressed? (Commissioner Cheek)
 - If there are not enough funds remaining from the bonds to finish the projects, then DPS would present the dilemma to the Board of County Commissioners and DPS Board of Education.
- Accepting donated property from the Egypt Development, if the site is approved (Commissioner Heron)
 - o DPS does not accept donated property that is of poor quality.
- Mobile classrooms for music and art (Commissioner Heron)
 - Mobile classrooms allow the physical classrooms to be restored to their original conditions.
- Cafeteria and restroom space (Commissioner Heron)
 - The cafeteria requires a permanent addition, which is scheduled for completion after the new addition in 2009. Three mobile restroom units will be placed next to the onsite trailers. Canopies will be added over the walkways.

Chairman Forte-Brown spoke to the overcrowding at Creekside Elementary School.

Mr. Schewel addressed Commissioner Heron's comments regarding the relationship between the approval of developments and infrastructures. He encouraged the Board of County Commissioners to consider overcrowded areas in Durham during the next bond issuance.

Chairman Reckhow recommended that the demographer working with DPS consider the situation relative to a 110% capacity in elementary, middle, and high schools. If any of the schools exceed 110%, then neither the City nor the County is permitted to approve new developments in that area.

Per a request by Chairman Reckhow, Mr. Osteen and Mr. Schewel provided a brief update on a request by the Board of County Commissioners in 2002 for DPS to adopt high performance guidelines for new facilities.

Chairman Reckhow emphasized the importance of reducing energy costs.

Ms. Kainz suggested that the City and County officials work together to remedy overcrowding and encourage sustainability.

Chairman Reckhow stated that Ms. Kainz's suggestion will be raised at the next Joint City-County Planning Committee meeting. She noted that a City-County sustainability manager has been hired.

Mr. Osteen responded to Chairman Reckhow that DPS employs a coordinator who tracks the utility rates and usage, not necessarily sustainability.

Major School Programs/Initiatives Update

School Board Chairman Forte-Brown introduced Dr. Terri Mozingo, Chief Academic Officer, Durham Public Schools (DPS), to present the update on major school programs and initiatives.

Dr. Mozingo thanked the Boards for the opportunity to provide them with an overview of the programs and initiatives. DPS staff addressed questions by the Board of County Commissioners throughout the presentation.

Chairman Reckhow and Vice-Chairman Page thanked DPS staff for the excellent presentation.

Chairman Reckhow inquired about outreach measures taken to increase enrollment at Middle College at DTCC. She urged DPS staff to consider additional ways to inform citizens of the College opportunities.

Citizen Comments

Chairman Reckhow called for citizen comments; as no citizen requested to speak, she recognized School Board Member Heidi Carter for comments.

Ms. Carter suggested that offering mental health services to students may decrease the drop-out rate.

Chairman Reckhow concurred with Ms. Carter's suggestion. Chairman Reckhow stated that subsequent to learning about a mobile mental health team in Milwaukee, she asked the Mental Health Director to explore the mobile team model to determine if it could be used at the schools.

Commissioner Heron stressed that health needs and solutions should go beyond mental health.

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Chairman Reckhow and Ms. Carter briefly discussed poor eating habits of students.

Chairman Reckhow requested that School Board members with an interest in particular results-based accountability (RBA) areas work with the appropriate RBA groups. She suggested that a School Board member work with the RBA health group that will be following up on the youth health risk behavior survey, as well as a School Board member to work with the education and safety RBA groups.

Vice-Chairman Page emphasized the importance of educating parents on the health risk of children and how to prevent them, such as feeding children breakfast.

Chairman Forte-Brown noted that Channel 14 lists Durham Public Schools as No. 5 in the nation for obesity.

Board members held a brief discussion regarding students eating breakfast.

Chairman Reckhow stated that the Board of County Commissioners would like to meet with the DPS Board of Education more frequently. She recommended that the two Boards meet semi-annually and add meetings throughout the year as necessary.

Adjournment

Chairman Reckhow invited School Board members to join the Commissioners for dinner in the Commissioners' Conference Room. There being no further business, Chairman Reckhow adjourned the meeting at 6:09 p.m.
