Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to meet the new County Food Security Coordinator and welcome her to Durham County Government and to the important work of addressing our community's food security.

Created by the BOCC in 2020 with community input and support, the County Food Security Coordinator is responsible for driving county- and community-wide efforts around food access and food policy initiatives and practices in Durham County, developing and maintaining collaborative partnerships with organizations and individuals, and supporting Durham County food security initiatives, teams, and task forces.

Mary Oxendine joined Durham County as our first County Food Security Coordinator in April 2021. Mary is a North Carolina native and a member of the Lumbee and Tuscarora tribes. She has over 12-years of experience planning, developing, implementing and evaluating health promotion and disease prevention programs. She has expertise in qualitative research methods, as well as managing

large scale, multi-year, complex projects with budgets up to \$3.5 million. Mary has studied food insecurity in low-income and Latinx communities and supported the Congressionally appointed National Commission on Hunger. She also has lived experience with food insecurity, having grown up with a single mother and experienced the impacts of generational poverty. Mary has a Bachelor of Arts in Public Policy from UNC-Chapel Hill and is currently completing a Master of Science in Nutrition at Meredith College. Leading the way with cultural humility and inclusive approaches, she is excited to partner with local organizations, individuals, and government agencies to create lasting change regarding food security in Durham County.

Approval of Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 21BCC000110 to Recognize \$100,000 from North Carolina Biotechnology Center for a Local Economic Development Award and to disburse the funds to GRAIL, Inc.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 21BCC000110 to recognize \$100,000 from the North Carolina Biotechnology Center for a Local Economic Development Award (EDA) to then be disbursed by the County to GRAIL, Inc. The NC Biotechnology Center has agreed to provide an economic development grant award through the County to encourage the expansion and maintenance of new business operations in Durham County. By disbursing the funds to the local unit of government, the County is able to maintain a direct relationship with GRAIL, Inc.

As part of their agreement, GRAIL, Inc. will create at least two hundred and three (203) new FTEs by December 31, 2023 and maintain through the following year. Included as part of the agreement's use of funds are the following community engagements and benefits:

• GRAIL will use EDA funds to enhance their talent pipeline through the support of eight (8) undergraduate internships as well as Six Sigma training focused on improving processes and operations and reporting across the

company. Six Sigma will be provided for 10-15 employees per year. Internships will be provided for the following undergraduate areas of studies: Software, Process Engineering and Supply Chain.

The North Carolina Biotechnology Center collaborates with North Carolina communities to attract life science economic development projects. Its Bioscience Industrial Development team provides industry-specific expertise and resources. The Center also supports community efforts through its Economic Development Award (EDA) Program. The EDA Program provides performance-based grants to local units of government in support of life science company projects.

Grants are linked to job creation and retention milestones for specific company projects in the locality of interest. The local government administers the grant and allocates funds to the company to be used for project-related investments providing sustainable benefit to the company and community. The Center partners with both community and company to determine the appropriate use of EDA funds. In the case of the three agreements receiving the awards, funds will be used to contribute to the cost of real and tangible personal property investments with portions to be either spent on machinery and/or equipment or operations and/or research and development

The Snow Hill Road Pump Station (SHRPS) was identified as a limiting factor in growth in the Treyburn business district in 2013. Although the SHRPS was upgraded in 2015, the pump station is no longer capable of being upgraded to sufficiently convey wastewater from the Treyburn business district and must be replaced with a larger station and separate force main. Multiple industries within the Treyburn area are in design or construction for expansions of their current facilities; therefore, economic development and job creation will be halted until the SHRPS is complete. On August 26, 2019, the Board approved Capital Project Amendment No. 20CPA000002 in the amount of \$12,685,000 as well as the design-build contract execution with Wharton-Smith/Hazen and Sawyer. The Board has previously approved GMP#1 on May 11, 2020 and GMP#2 on October 12, 2020.

GMP #3 Contract Package consists of the pump station building and mechanical trades as well as the remaining site work. These trades include masonry, roof, doors, windows, life safety, grading, paving, concrete, fencing, and signage. The force main will be submitted under a future contract amendment. In an attempt to solicit the greatest feedback from the construction industry, the scope of work for GMP #3 was separated into 19 bid packages. Bids were received on September 25, 2020 with a few packages needing re-advertisement due to low participation. The re-advertised bids were received on October 2, 2020. The final bid analysis provided a very low MWBE participation, much of which can be attributed to a robust workload across these industries. Despite the lack of MWBE participation in this GMP Package, the project will continue to solicit MWBE participation where possible.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: This action is in accordance with Durham County Strategic Plan Goal 4: "Environmental Stewardship and Community Prosperity," as this project will ensure a quality delivery of the Snow Hill Road Pump Station to promote economic development.

Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 21BCC000111 to recognize \$13,733 on behalf of the NC State Extension NC Farm School for Cooperative Extension to Operate the regional NC Farm School program in Durham County through 2022.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No 21BCC000111 to recognize \$13,733 in funding to operate the regional NC Farm School program in Durham County through December 30, 2022.

North Carolina Farm School (NCFS) in Durham County will serve approximately 25 farmers through a unique entrepreneurial "learn-plan-do" program for new and transitioning farmers with the mission of increasing the number of successful farmers in North Carolina.

The total funding for the program is \$13,773, which includes \$5,779 in funds from the previous Farm School and \$7,994 in funds that will be collected in fees from participants by Durham County Cooperative Extension. The funding covers all costs incurred by Durham County to implement the program. At the end of the program, Durham County will remit any remaining funds collected, expected to be around \$5,500, to the County Extension Center awarded the program the following year.

NCFS will operate in a multi-county cluster based in Durham for 2021-2022 with area Extension Agents who lend their knowledge of sound production practices and crop management decision-making to deliver a comprehensive farm business curriculum over a four-month period. Local farmers host the program and describe the challenges they faced as they started their own farms. The classroom business sessions are reinforced with multiple farm visits and participants apply what they learn through homework assignments and a web-based business plan program.

21-0313 Execution of Architectural Services Agreement with Vines

Architecture Inc. LLC. for the Analysis and Conceptual Studies for the Former DSS Main St. Facility - Project No. 4730DC148

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to authorize the County Manager to enter into a contract with Vines Architecture Inc. LLC. (Vines) of Durham to provide architectural services for the Analysis and Conceptual Studies for the Former DSS Main St. Facility, located at the 220 East Main Street, Durham, in the amount of \$145,5000.00 plus a reimbursable expenses allowances in the amount of \$3,000.00 thus totaling a not to exceed amount of \$148,500,000.00 (See Attachment 1, Pages 1-8).

Durham County ("County") is seeking to redevelop DSS Main in a manner that best meets the public interests. To this end, the County has engaged the Development Finance Initiative (DFI) to provide pre-development services for the redevelopment of the DSS Main property. The pre-development process involves several key components - public engagement, a parcel analysis to understand current conditions in downtown, a site-specific market analysis, site planning, and a financial feasibility analysis. The work will culminate in a competitive solicitation process to identify a qualified development partner to execute the County's vision for the site.

The services provided by the architectural team will focus on site planning and providing key inputs for the financial feasibility analysis. Vines will work closely with DFI to explore multiple redevelopment scenarios for the property including adaptive reuse and repurposing of the structure. Uses may include office, civic, education, retail, flex, residential and others that emerge through the engagement process. Development scenarios should take into consideration the surrounding area (adjacent streets, proximate buildings, and downtown context), resulting in a plan that can help activate this section of East Main Street. This process will help the County identify a feasible redevelopment plan that meets both public and private sector interests.

The request for qualifications (RFQ) for architectural services for the project was advertised in local newspapers on February 10, 2021. Seven (7) responses were received on March 11, 2021 and were evaluated by a selection committee representing the Development Finance Initiative and County Engineering. The firm of Vines Architecture Inc. LLC. was determined to be the most qualified firm to provide design services for this project. For M/WBE participation information (See Attachment 2, Page 1).

It is recommended that the County proceed with the work in the proposal dated May 14, 2021 in the total amount not to exceed \$148,500.00. Funding for this service is available in the DSS Main Street Renovation Capital project account.

Alignment With Strategic Plan: This request aligns with Strategic Plan Goal #5 - (Accountable, Efficient and Visionary Government) - by providing a phased predevelopment process to determine the highest and best use for the facility allowing it to be repurposed to meet Durham County's goals through the development of this

community resource.

21-0300 Public Hearing to Consider Allocating Economic Development Funds to CARsgen Therapeutics (20min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to hold a public hearing to consider allocating a total of \$1,000,000 to CARsgen Therapeutics and authorize the County Manager or Interim County Manager to enter into preliminary negotiations and execute an agreement with the Company. CARsgen, which specializes in CAR-T cell therapy research and production, will locate in Durham, creating 200 jobs and investing \$157 million.

CARsgen Therapeutics Corporation, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CARsgen Therapeutics Holdings Limited, is a clinical stage biotechnology company specializing in what's known as chimeric antigen receptor (CAR) T cell therapies, a type of therapy that engages people's immune systems in a new way. The therapeutic approach can yield medicines for various human cancers, including leukemia, lymphoma, and solid tumors. The company's project in North Carolina will establish a 37,000 square foot clinical/early-stage commercial manufacturing facility and then a 100,000 square foot cGMP commercial manufacturing facility in Durham that will eventually produce FDA approved cell therapies.

With approval of the award, the CARsgen has agreed to make reasonable efforts to participate in several workforce partnerships that include specific engagements with Durham Public Schools Career and Technical Education, Durham Technical Community College, North Carolina Central's University and NC Works Career Center Durham. Please find additional project details including a full list of partnerships, terms and project attributes in the briefing sheet attached to the agenda item that include specific commitments towards diversity purchasing, sustainability and workforce development.

CARsgen's presence in North Carolina will be facilitated, in part, by a Job Development Investment Grant (JDIG) approved by the state's Economic Investment Committee on May 20th. Over the 12-year life of the grant, the project is estimated to grow the state's economy by nearly \$1.04 billion. Payments for all JDIG and local awards only occur following performance verification that the Company has met its incremental job creation and investment targets. The anticipated revenue that the project will generate is at least twice the size of the proposed local award and payment to the Company occurs only after the annual verification of jobs and investment criteria starting in 2021.

Staff is recommending that the County provide \$1,000,000 in Economic

Development Investment funds to CARsgen subject to performance goals being met by the Company related to timing and amount of investment, employment creation and maintenance of the created jobs as well as partnership engagement criteria.

21-0330 Durham County Board of Elections Space Request (15min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve a feasibility study dedicated to finding a 40,000 to 50,000 Ft2 contiguous facility for the Durham County Board of Elections (BOE) prior to 2024. Providing the BOE with the requested space will enhance the security, efficiency, and effectiveness of elections in Durham County. Currently, the primary BOE offices are located at 201 N. Roxboro Street (Primary Administrative Office) and 2445 S. Alston Avenue (Primary Warehouse Space). Due to space inadequacies, the BOE was required to use an additional 4,324 Ft2 of space in three off-site locations at the Durham County Administration II building in 2020. In elections prior to 2020, the Board also has utilized conference rooms comprised of 1,994 Ft2 in the Health and Human Services Building.

Based on the current space allocated, the Board of Elections will be required to utilize multiple buildings moving forward, which will continue to affect the security, efficiency, and effectiveness of elections in Durham County. To address continuing space constraints affecting the administration of elections, on May 13, 2021, the Board of Elections submitted a formal letter to the Board of County Commissioners detailing concerns related to the space allocated to the Board of Elections (attached).
