Durham County Government Recognized with three (3) 2021 Achievement Awards by the National Association of Counties (NACo) (10min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to recognize several departments that recently were named recipients of a 2021 NACo Achievement Award. The NACo Achievement Awards began in 1970, and NACo recognized 13 different categories this year including civic education and public information, community economic development, county administration and management, health, human services, and many more.

Board of Elections

NACo recognized the Durham County Board of Elections for its Board of Elections Poll Count Application. First used in the 2020 Primary and General Elections, the Poll Count application streamlined and expedited opening and closing processes, and greatly reduced the number of Election Day telephone calls to the Board of Elections regarding precinct opening and unofficial counts. It also simplified responding to requests for publicly available voter turnout information. The Best in Category selection for the Board of Elections Poll Count Application fell under County Administration and Management.

Public Health

NACo recognized the Durham County Department of Public Health for its COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Dashboard. As COVID-19 vaccine distribution began, Durham County Public Health needed a simple way to view and monitor data about COVID-19 vaccinations for county residents. Public Health, Office of Emergency Services, and Information Services and Technology collaborated to develop the COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Dashboard, which transforms raw data about Durham County COVID-19 vaccinations into an easy-to-read, interactive format. The Best in Category for the COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Dashboard was listed under Health.

Tax Administration

NACo recognized Durham County Tax Administration for its multi-faceted

COVID-19 Response. Tax Administration deployed a remote call center through a new tool called Jabber, and the department implemented a public live chat feature on the Tax website. The live chat feature has reduced wait times and received a 99%+ satisfaction rate through more than 3,500 live chats so far. Additionally, the department migrated to a digital review space allowing taxpayers to have their appeal cases heard via Zoom. Tax Administration also implemented the Long-Term Payment Plan Deferral Program created for individuals that may not qualify for state relief programs. This award selection for Best in Category was also represented under County Administration and Management.

Contract with Reach Out and Read Carolinas to Continue Co-Location of Their Early Literacy Initiative in Pediatric and Primary Care Sites in Durham County

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve the contract with Reach Out and Read Carolinas (RORC) for \$50,000 and authorize the County Manager execute the contract to continue co-location of their early literacy initiative in pediatric sites in Durham County.

Supporting access to educational enrichment is so important as COVID continues to disrupt learning for many young and school-aged children in Durham. Reach Out and Read promotes early literacy by training providers in pediatric offices in early literacy and providing books for children and their parent at every well-child visit birth-five. RORC continued their efforts to support early literacy last fiscal year using co-location to meet families where they are already gathering.

Reach Out and Read reports that County funding has been critical to sustaining the initiative as COVID significantly impacted delivery of and attendance at well-child visits. During the pandemic, they have pivoted to continue to serve families in physically distanced ways as needed, including training providers on how to use the ROR curriculum in telehealth visits. County funding has also supported efforts to

diversify the books provided by RORC, increasing the effectiveness of books as mirrors and windows for young children and their families, providing opportunities for cultural affirmation and supporting positive identity. This fiscal year they will continue the work referenced above as they expand into more primary care sites across Durham County.

For these reasons, and because books and reading together can be a stress-reducing and connective activity for children, parents, and providers during times of crisis, funding for Reach Out and Read is recommended to be continued in FY 21-22.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 22BCC00012 to acknowledge County Required Match as Part of the Durham County's FY 2022 Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) County Funding Plan and to Recognize \$101,017 in additional funding, which includes funding for Covid Supplemental Nutrition funds (HDc5), FY 2021-22 HCBG Funding Plan Allocation Funds, and an Increase in County Funding Grant Match. \$96,148.85 of funding increase will be recognized via intergovernmental revenue and \$4967,16 of funding is the increase in County Funding Grant Match, which will be funded via General Fund fund balance. The Home and Community Care Block Care Grant (HCCBG), as authorized in G.S. 143B-181.1 (a) (11), is designed to improve the planning and coordination of in-home and community-based services provided to North Carolina's older adults. It is also intended to promote the visibility of aging programs at the local level by giving counties increased flexibility with respect to funding aging services available through the Block Grant. The majority of funding comprising the HCCBG is authorized by the federal Older Americans Act. There are federal mandates and priorities established by the Older Americans Act. Department (DSS) and the Durham Center for Senior Life (DCSL) are co-lead agencies for receiving the HCCBG funds and administering the programs. legislation provides for state and local discretion in the funding of particular services and programs.

The Board is also requested to approve the Department of Social Services request to recognize additional Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) Funds for supplemental nutrition in response to COVID-19 for the FY2021-2022 Budget year.

HDC5 funding is being provided to each of North Carolina's 16 Area Agencies on Aging via the intrastate funding formula (10A NCAC 05C. 0404) for the purpose of responding to the COVID- 19 public health emergency. The funds will be made available in one grant - Home-Delivered Meals Service. While under a major disaster declaration, flexibility to "bucket" funds remain in place. This flexibility means that these home-delivered meals service funds can also be used for the congregate nutrition program service.

Counties are advised to base HCCBG services planning on current year funding levels when preparing the new fiscal year budget because the HCCBG Funding Plan is not finalized in advance of the budget being entered for the department. Therefore, DSS FY2021-22 Adopted Budget was \$819,192, when current funding plan requires an increase in budgeted expenditures and revenue to correspond with the HCCBG allocation.

Request Refund of Excise Tax Overpayment to Old Republic National Commercial Services

The Board is requested to refund the overpayment of excise tax to Old Republic National Commercial Services. On Jul 26, 2021, a deed was electronically recorded in Durham County with an overpayment of excise taxes in the amount of \$2,855.00. Pursuant to N.C. Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 22BCC00010 Cooperative Extension to Appropriate \$382,265 of General Fund fund balance and Approval of the Contract Extension with Beyu Caffe to Continue Home Delivered Meals for Covid-19 Related Food Assistance to Seniors and Vulnerable populations

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 22BCC00010 to appropriate \$382,265 of General Fund fund balance and approve the Contract Extension with Beyu Caffé to continue home delivered meals for Covid-19 related Food Assistance to Seniors and Vulnerable Populations until November 30, 2021.

The program, currently funded from July 1 - August 31, 2021, is requested to be extended through November 30, 2021. Positive COVID cases in Durham County have risen dramatically in the last two months. According to the CDC, older adults and people with underlying medical conditions are at increased risk of severe COVID-19 associated illness. To reduce risk of being exposed to COVID-19, it is recommended that these populations physical distance, including limiting time spend in public places. These populations also experience high rates of food insecurity.

To support our most vulnerable populations, we propose extending the contract with Beyu Caffé to continue the EAT NC program. The meals provide support to individuals and families who are in need of direct-to-home delivery, focusing on (1) food insecure senior citizens and people with underlying medical conditions or (2) families needing to isolate/quarantine because of family members at high risk from COVID-19. The program has the added benefit of working with local restaurants to provide meals, maintaining jobs, and supporting Durham's economy, focusing on restaurants that are Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises.

The family meals delivery program will continue to operate with referrals from social workers, counselors, Public Health, Lincoln Community Health Center, DSS, etc. Senior citizens may be referred or self-identify. Current program participants may be allowed to continue receiving food without a new or additional referral; however, they will be required to complete an enrollment form to assess new eligibility criteria (i.e., senior citizen, underlying medical condition, food insecurity status, limited social support).

EAT NC, along with the County and community partners, will continue to examine transition planning beyond November 30, including providing referrals to food assistance programs.

21-0517 Purchase of Three Parcels on Electra Rd.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to authorize the purchase of three parcels on Electra Road, identified by parcel IDs 171569, 171570, 171571 for the combined amount of \$110,000, and to authorize the Interim County Manager to execute all legal documents necessary to effect this transaction. The three parcels are referenced on the attached map as numbers 7, 8 and 9.

On March 2, 2020, the Board received a report and provided direction pertaining to the County's need to purchase ten parcels along Electra Road to facilitate the planned upgrade of the Sheriff's Office Firing Range to include classroom space, and improved training capability on this site. The County engaged an outside attorney to perform the title examinations and contact all owners to present offers to purchase. Five of the properties have since been acquired by the County.

Property taxes were several years delinquent for four of the ten parcels. Every effort was made to contact the owners of these parcels to purchase them directly, but the owners were not able to be located. Foreclosure by the County Tax Administration was to begin in spring 2020, however, a moratorium on tax foreclosures was implemented due to the Covid 19 pandemic, and no action was taken until the moratorium was lifted on July 1, 2021.

The foreclosure auction took place on August 10, 2021. One other bidder

participated in the auction, and after several rounds, the County's final bid of \$110,000 was not raised. There is a ten-day upset bid period which ended on Friday, August 20, 2021. Sufficient funds exist in Sheriff Firing Range Capital Project DC091 for this acquisition.

<u>Alignment with Strategic Plan:</u> This agenda item supports Goal 5: Accountable, Efficient and Visionary Government.

Summary.

Brian Eaton of the Bahama Volunteer Fire Rescue Company, Inc. proposes to change the zoning designation of two parcels of land totaling 0.76 acres, and located 1426 Bahama Road. The current zoning is Commercial Neighborhood (CN) and Residential Suburban-20 (RS-20). The applicant proposes to change this designation for both parcels to Commercial Neighborhood with a text-only development plan (CN(D)). The proposed use limitations would prohibit any bar, nightclub, or other use that serves alcohol for on-site consumption. No change is proposed for the Lake Michie/Little River District A (M/LR-A) watershed overlay.

The parcel zoned CN is currently designated Commercial and the other, zoned

RS-20, is designated as Very Low Density Residential on the Future Land Use Map (FLUM) of the *Comprehensive Plan* (Attachment 3). The proposed CN(D) zoning is inconsistent with the parcel designated as Very Low Density Residential. If the proposed zoning is approved staff recommends a change to the FLUM to designate that parcel as Commercial.

21-0511 Public Hearing Approval to Consider Allocating Economic

Development Funds to Smart Wires Inc. (5min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to close the public hearing which was considered at the August 9th Regular Session meeting to allocate a total of \$125,000 to Smart Wires Inc. and authorize the County Manager or Interim County Manager to enter into preliminary negotiations and execute an agreement with the Company. Smart Wires, which specializes in electric bulk power transmission and control, will locate its corporate headquarters in Durham, creating 250 jobs and investing \$23.5 million.

Smart Wires stands at the vanguard of today's clean energy revolution, partnering with electric utilities around the world to improve the efficiency of electric transmission grids. Despite the many benefits of renewable energy sources for power generation, integrating sources such as solar or wind introduces complexity for grid operation. Smart Wire's flagship product SmartValveTM revolutionizes the power flow control landscape by dynamically increasing or decreasing line reactance, in essence pushing power off overloaded transmission lines and pulling it onto underutilized lines, ensuring power flows are efficient and balanced. The company also offers advanced analytics services for power system operations and planning.

With approval of the award, the Smart Wires has agreed to make reasonable efforts to participate in several workforce partnerships that include specific engagements with Durham Public Schools Career and Technical Education, Durham Technical Community College and Research Triangle Cleantech Cluster. Please find additional project details including a full list of partnerships, terms and project attributes in the briefing sheet attached to the agenda item.

Smart Wires' project in North Carolina will be facilitated by a Job Development Investment Grant (JDIG) approved by the state's Economic Investment Committee on July 27th. Over the course of the 12-year term of this grant, the project is estimated to grow the state's economy by \$3.07 billion. Payments for all JDIG and local awards only occur following performance verification that the Company has met its incremental job creation and investment targets. The anticipated revenue that the project will generate is at least twice the size of the proposed local award and payment to the Company occurs only after the annual verification of jobs and investment criteria starting in 2021.

Staff is recommending that the County provide \$125,000 in Economic Development Investment funds to Smart Wires subject to performance goals being met by the Company related to timing and amount of investment, employment creation and maintenance of the created jobs as well as partnership engagement criteria.
