Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve an extension of the *Building Bridges Between Jails and Community-Based Treatment for Opioid Use Disorder Demonstration Project* Grant with the Institute for Intergovernmental Research (IIR) until December 31, 2022; and authorize the Interim County Manager to sign the agreement. The Board is also requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No.22BCC00016 recognizing an additional \$17,000 in grant funding for the Durham County Sheriff's Office from IIR.

On February 28, 2020, the Sheriff's Office was awarded a grant funding opportunity from the Institute of Intergovernmental Research (IIR) in the amount of \$93,750 to be utilized from March 1, 2020 to August 31, 2021. The funding was budgeted in the Approved FY 2021-22 Budget. IIR has approved a 16-month grant extension lasting until December 31, 2022. IIR has also awarded the Sheriff's Office an additional \$17,000 in funding to be utilized over this time period.

These funds will be used to install data lines, purchase office furniture, and install a sink in the Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) Room. The remaining funds will be used to purchase five (5) doses of Sublocade, a controlled substance used as medication for opioid use disorders. Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Phase I was created for detainees with opioid use disorders (OUD) to continue their treatment while detained. This grant extension will help support the implementation of MAT Phase II, which expands medication for opioid use disorders (MOUD) and allows detainees to start the program while housed inside the facility.

IIR is aware of the potential September 13, 2021, BOCC approval date, which goes beyond the time period of the initial agreement and has advised that it will not impact the continuation of this grant. There is no County match required for this grant.

Budget Ordinance Amendment No 22BCC00017 to recognize \$14,000 in Grant Revenue from the Burt's **Bees Foundation** support an updated biological inventory for the New Hope Creek corridor.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No <u>22BCC00017</u> recognizing \$14,000 in grant revenue from the Burt's Bees Foundation to support an updated biological inventory for the New Hope Creek corridor.

The New Hope Creek corridor is considered one of the State's most significant natural areas. This corridor supports rare animal and plant communities and provides a critical ecological route for wildlife from its headwaters in Orange County downstream to Jordan Lake in Chatham County. New Hope Creek also provides an important riparian catchment for protecting water quality for Jordan Lake. Biological Inventories are important to document a snapshot of the variety and ecological health of important natural areas. The last comprehensive inventory of species in the New Hope Creek corridor was sponsored by Durham County and dates to 1995 and is considered significantly out of date. This updated Inventory will provide a unique opportunity to gain insights from the updated species confirmed to be present and will be conducted on over 3 miles of corridor in a highly developing area. The results will improve land management decisions and assist in protecting and enhancing Durham's biodiversity and land protection efforts.

The northern boundary of the study area is Erwin Road at Hollow Rock Nature Park, extending southward to Old Chapel Hill Road in Durham. The study area is primarily owned by Durham County, which has acquired over 323 acres in 17 different properties as part of the overall effort to protect this environmental significant natural corridor. The Inventory update will be conducted by the N.C. Biodiversity Project, a non-profit organization comprised of N.C. respected field biologists.

The Durham community is fortunate to have the Burt's Bees corporate headquarters in downtown Durham. The Burt's Bees Foundation prioritizes funding projects that support community resiliency as well as ecological health, with a focus on the Durham community. Past local recipients have included the John Avery Boys and Girls Club, Farmer Foodshare, the Eno River Association, Triangle Land Conservancy, and the Ellerbe Creek Watershed Association. The study will get underway this fall and will take a full year to complete. No financial match for the grant is required.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: This grant and environmental study supports Goal 4: "Environmental Stewardship and Community Prosperity" as well as Goal 5: "Accountable, Efficient and Visionary Government"

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve the final budget for Phase II of the McFarland Farm Conservation Easement, as well as approve Capital Project Amendment No.22CPA000006 decreasing the Open Space & Farmland Preservation Capital Project (4730DC083) by \$72,160 and Budget Amendment No.22BCC000015 transferring \$72,160 from the Pay-As-You-Go Capital Project Fund to the General Fund to support the purchase of an additional 11.012 acres of the McFarland Farm conservation easement.

The McFarland farm is strategically located in northeast Durham, at the intersection of Snow Hill and Infinity Roads within Durham's suburban tier in an environmentally significant location near the confluence the Eno and Little Rivers (see attached maps). In December 2020 the County purchased the first 86.37 acres of this easement project, funded by federal NRCS ALE grant funds, Durham County, and a landowner donation.

The Board previously approved the option to purchase this second part of the McFarland conservation easement, with the requirement that grant funds pay a portion of the acquisition costs. The Board also previously approved the federal cooperative agreement when the Agricultural Lands Easement Program (ALE) grant funds were awarded to assist with the easement purchase. As shown in the attached budget, this is the second phase of the overall 97.5-acre conservation easement project. For the overall project, the combined appraised value was \$1,137,000, with

the federal ALE program contributing a total of \$559,000. The landowner has donated \$216,276 in appraisal land value, in what is termed a "bargain sale". Durham County will contribute a total of \$368,330 to the overall project, or 32% of the easement value.

The federal cooperative agreement provides funds for 50% of the easement value. The January 2021 appraisal was federally approved and provides an easement value of \$140,000, equating to \$12,713 per acre. NRCS has also approved the easement deed, title work, and sufficient funding for their portion of the project price (\$70,000). Durham County will provide \$70,000 of the remaining purchase price that is not grant funded, for a total with closing costs of \$72,160. The transfer of \$72,160 from the open space and farmland capital project account to the General fund for the purchase of the land is a technical transfer that provides the Finance Department with a more concise end of year accounting of assets purchased by the County in each fiscal year. The County Manager was previously authorized to execute the final easement documents as well.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: This acquisition helps to implement Strategic Plan Goal 4, "Environmental Stewardship and Community Prosperity," by increasing the amount of open space and farmland that has been protected by Durham County.

Contract Amendment and Budget Amendment Establishing and Adding Funds for the FY21-22 Durham Pre-K Contract with Child Care Services Association

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve the attached contract amendment and associated budget amendment establishing an increased FY21-22 Durham Pre-K contract amount for Child Care Services Association.

The purpose of this contract amendment and the associated budget amendment is twofold. The first goal is to amend the three-year contract the County has with Child Care Services Association (CCSA) for administration of our universal Durham Pre-K program to add the specific, budgeted amount for FY21-22. FY20-21 was the first year of a three-year extension during which CCSA would administer Durham Pre-K on behalf of Durham County's. The FY20-21 budget included flat funding for Durham Pre-K at \$3,846,840, not including over \$2 million in additional pre-k support going directly to Durham Public Schools. Of the amount going to CCSA, \$3,033,107 flows through CCSA directly to providers for instructional services, and the remaining \$813,733 support a wide variety of system management and system

development services, including professional development for teachers and program directors.

For FY21-22, there was both growth in the incremental Article 46 sales tax revenues that no longer go directly to Durham Public Schools (for pre-K) as well as the additional \$250,000 approved by Commissioners during budget negotiations, resulting in a new total of \$4,118,517. The bulk of the new funding will support additional instructional services (additional "seats"), with smaller amounts supporting program management costs as well as implementation of some activities suggested in a racial equity plan adopted by Durham PreK's Governance Committee after a one year study completed by members of the Quality Subcommittee and which was presented to the BOCC in May 2021.

Finally, based on recently announced changes in NC Pre-K reimbursement policy for at least the first half of this school year, the Governance Committee of Durham Pre-K has approved a request to Commissioners for additional funding so that Durham Pre-K can continue supporting the same number of seats rather than reduce seats to meet the higher costs. If the NCPK reimbursement changes last all year, the additional cost could amount to \$90,000 over the \$4,118,517 currently budgeted. Staff are recommending that \$60,000 of fund balance be added now (leading to a total of \$4,178,517 showing in the proposed contract amendment) and that, pending a mid-year review, the County Manager be empowered to add up to \$30,000 more should the situation warrant it.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: A robust universe of early childhood programs, including universal pre-K, has great potential to improve outcomes across all outward-facing goals in the Durham County Strategic Plan.

Approval of Contract with Hagerty Consulting for Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack (CCTA) Training

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve a contract with Hagerty Consulting Inc. to develop several training courses to help Durham County prepare a regional coordination plan for possible Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attacks and authorize the Interim County Manager to execute the contract. The training courses include Mass Casualty Recovery, Friend/Family Assistance, Intelligence and Investigations, Public/Crisis Information, and Dispatch/Public Safety Communications. The courses will be available to Durham City and County and other regional mutual aid responders. The end deliverable is a comprehensive, multi-modal training program that is developed using input gathered from local, state, and national subject matter experts, and from lessons learned from recent mass casualty events in the United States.

The Federal Uniform Guidance was followed as part of the RFP process. Hagerty Inc. was the only vendor to respond to the RFP and was subsequently awarded the contract for services. The contract is firm-fixed-price not to exceed \$180,000 with a period of performance that ends on March 31, 2022. FEMA grant money will pay for the contract and the funding is in the FY 21/22 OES budget.

<u>Alignment with Strategic Plan:</u> This request aligns with the County's Strategic Goal 3: Safe Community, and Goal 5: Accountable, Efficient, and Visionary Government.

21-0547 Alliance Health Services Carry-Over Funds from FY 2020-21 into FY 2021-22

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to support the \$650,000 identified by Alliance Health Services to carryover from FY 2020-21 into FY 2021-22. The remaining \$1,040,000 will be evaluated for consideration mid-year, bringing the total amount to \$1,690,000 eligible for behavioral health service above base budget allocations. Proposed funding use includes to expand mental health services for individuals at the Carolina Duke COVID shelter and transition to a general shelter support team post COVID. In addition, funds will support expanded crisis response improvement for kids including start-up funding for Mobile Outreach, Response, Engagement and Stabilization (MORES), a specialize mobile crisis response model for children and families which includes 45 days of post crisis home visits and support. Costs would cover facility upfit or renovation and provider start-up funding. Long term funding would be covered by Medicaid.

Additional updates will occur on the funding mid-year after a review of county-wide funding to support behavioral health services. This action does not require a budget amendment. The funds are currently in Alliance Health Service fund balance reserves as unspent funding.

21-0550 BOCC Approval of Budget Ordinance Amendment No.22BCC00018 recognizing \$318,750 of FY 2021-22 Governor's Highway Safety Program (GHSP) Grant Funding

Agenda Text:

Budget Ordinance The Board is requested to approve Amendment No.22BCC00018 recognizing \$318,750 of FY 2021-22 Governor's Highway Safety Program (GHSP) grant funding. The GHSP this fiscal year awarded the Durham County Sheriff's Office a four-year grant totaling \$1,127,161 - the figure includes local match funding - that will be used to fund three new sworn deputy positions to work traffic enforcement over the four-year grant period, beginning October 1, 2021. The local match for the first year is \$121,849, which will be covered by existing DSO FY 2021-22 budget. The budget amendment and the local match are combined for a total amount of \$440,599 for the FY 2021-22 fiscal year.

The GHSP grant is a step-down reimbursement grant that requires a match at varying percentages each year. The total federal reimbursement over the four-year grant period will be \$659,396, and the total local match over the same four-year period will \$467,764, for a total grant amount of \$1,127,161. Future matches will be budgeted in subsequent fiscal years as needed through operational and staffing efficiencies.

The Governor's Highway Safety Program helps fund efforts of law enforcement agencies to reduce traffic crashes in North Carolina. Specifically, this grant will provide funding to the Durham County Sheriff's Office over a four-year period for (3) new sworn officers, (3) vehicles and associated equipment. In terms of traffic related outcomes, Durham County is ranked within North Carolina for the following categories:

- 10th Highest in Overall Fatalities
- 12th Highest in Alcohol Fatalities
- 10th Highest in Unrestrained Fatalities
- 8th Highest in Speed Related Fatalities

The following goals have been identified for this program:

- To reduce traffic fatalities in Durham County by 25% from the 2015-2019 average of 29.2 fatalities per year to less than 22 fatalities during FY 21/22.
- To reduce the number of unrestrained fatalities by 10% from the 2015-2019 average of 9.2 crashes per year to less than 8 crashes during the fiscal year October 1, 2021 to September 30, 2022.
- To reduce the number of speed related crashes by 15% from the 2015-2019 average of 534.2 crashes per year to less than 454 crashes during the fiscal year October 1, 2021 to September 30, 2022.

A review of the Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) will occur in upcoming months as established during the FY 2021-22 budget process. In addition to this assessment, an internal review of operational budgets that currently support behavioral health services in the human services departments including Alliance, DSS and Public Health and the public safety areas including EMS, the Criminal Justice Resource Center and the Sheriff's Office will occur. This evaluation will also identify opportunities to

coordinate County and City of Durham efforts related to behavioral health service initiatives.

As behavioral health gaps are identified, the goal is to close such funding gaps through the realignment of existing budgets, use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding, grant funding, and lapsed salaries created by vacant positions. The Governor's Highway Safety Grant Program will help lessen the local funding support to address highway safety issues. Such support could possibly create local capacity to address behavioral health service gaps.

The total County responsibility for the project is \$2,468,366. That figure includes a 27% EMS Facility Cost share (\$2,280,125); as well as the provisioning of furniture, fixtures & equipment, IT, technology and other EMS-specific provisioning, and a contingency amount of 5% of the EMS portion of the facility cost. There is also a Durham County Fire and Rescue Service District cost share that is included as well and was budgeted as a part of the approved FY 2021-22 budget (more detail on this below).

Background

In spring of 2016, the Board of County Commissioners requested that EMS work with the City of Durham Fire Department to explore the creation of co-located fire and EMS facilities to create cost efficiencies and provide more effective public safety services. The Station 17 co-located public safety facility - jointly developed between the County EMS Department and City of Durham Fire Department and located at 5503 Leesville Road - was the first joint facility developed. This station was approved by the Board on April 24, 2017.

Subsequently, on June 25, 2018, the Board approved an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with the City of Durham for the provision of consolidated fire, rescue and first responder services in the southern part of Durham County. The IGA included provisions for the joint development and cost share for two new co-located facilities to be built: Station 18 is to replace DCFR Station 83 on Seaton Road and is the subject of this Agenda Item, and Station 19 to replace DCFR Station 81 on Old Page Road and is scheduled for construction in 2023.

The design concept for Station 18 is a modified version of the prototype design used in Station 17. The primary difference from the EMS perspective is the addition of a second double Ambulance Bay, which increases the EMS square footage allocation from 24% to 27% of the total building area. A design rendering (Attachment A) and a space allocation floor plan (Attachment B) have been included in the attachments along with the Joint Use Agreement (Attachment C), Interlocal Agreement (Attachment D), and Cost Share Spreadsheet (Attachment E).

Total square footage for the facility is 13,318 square feet with 3,592 square feet dedicated for EMS usage and 1,192 square feet of shared space. Cost allocation for the facility is 73% / 27% split based on square footage usage.

"Guaranteed Maximum Price" cost of design and construction of the facility is \$8,444,906, excluding City and County specific costs, such as Furniture, Fixtures, and Equipment (FF&E), Technology and Security, etc.) with the County's share totaling \$2,280,125 (27%).

County-specific costs totaling \$188,241 for the provisioning of furniture, fixtures & equipment, IT, technology and other EMS-specific provisioning, including a contingency amount of 5% of the EMS portion of the facility cost, will be paid for separately by the County bringing the total County facility cost to \$2,468,366.

Summary.

Brian Eaton of the Bahama Volunteer Fire Rescue Company, Inc. proposes to change the zoning designation of two parcels of land totaling 0.76 acres and located 1426 Bahama Road. The current zoning is Commercial Neighborhood (CN) and Residential Suburban-20 (RS-20). The applicant proposes to change this designation for both parcels to Commercial Neighborhood with a text-only development plan (CN(D)). The proposed use limitations would prohibit any bar, nightclub, or other use that serves alcohol for on-site consumption. No change is proposed for the Lake Michie/Little River District A (M/LR-A) watershed overlay.

The parcel zoned CN is currently designated Commercial and the other, zoned RS-20, is designated as Very Low Density Residential on the Future Land Use Map (FLUM) of the *Comprehensive Plan* (Attachment 3). The proposed CN(D) zoning is inconsistent with the parcel designated as Very Low Density Residential. If the proposed zoning is approved staff recommends a change to the FLUM to designate that parcel as Commercial.

21-0538 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (45min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to receive a presentation from the Durham-Chapel Hill-Carrboro Metropolitan Planning Organization (DCHC MPO) on the development of the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) and provide comments.

The DCHC MPO is responsible for long range transportation planning for Durham County and parts of Orange and Chatham Counties and is updating the MTP. The MTP, which is required by Federal law, recommends major transportation projects, policies and strategies designed to maintain existing transportation systems and serve the region's future travel needs. The Plan must be fiscally constrained, which means that projected revenues must cover the anticipated costs. Projects must be in the

2050 MTP to receive any state and federal transportation funding through the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Projects are drawn from the MTP and put forward to the State's prioritization process for inclusion in the TIP, which is a 10-year funding program.

The MPO has released the Alternatives Analysis for public comment. The alternatives are combinations of a transportation network, which includes a set of highway, transit and other transportation improvements, and a land use scenario that depicts the distribution of population and employment for the year 2050. These alternatives are then analyzed using the Triangle Regional Model (TRM) which forecasts future travel statistics based on assumptions concerning the highway network, transit service and other transportation facilities.

The MPO will conduct further project and financial analyses as well as consider public and board comments over the next few months to inform the development of the Preferred Option for the 2050 MTP. It is very unlikely that one of the Alternatives in its entirety would be advanced as the Preferred Option. Most likely, the final MTP will be a combination of the various alternatives. The 2050 MTP is proposed to be approved by the MPO Board in December.

Due to the length and depth of the Alternatives Analysis, staff has prepared a presentation that summarizes some key areas of interest to Durham County. Greater detail on the analysis and other process components can be found on the DCHC MPO website:
