21-0736 Introduction of City-County Immigrant and Refugee Affairs Strategist (10min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to welcome the new employee and ask any questions they wish.

As part of budget discussions for the FY21-22 budget, funding was included in both City and County budgets for the creation and support of a new position - the Immigrant and Refugee Affairs Strategist. City and County agreed to house the position in the City's Neighborhood Improvement Services Department and to provide additional support funds for the position.

County staff from several different departments assisted with the interview and hiring process. Ms. Selina Máté was selected from among the candidates and began work on November 1st. Ms. Mate has a bachelor degree in history and legal studies from Huntington University. She most recently worked for World Relief Durham, an organization which helps newly arrived refugees and other immigrants access basic necessities to begin them on the journey to belonging through English classes, immigration legal services, employment services, and more. There she designed and implemented the Youth Mentorship Program that equipped refugee youth to pursue vocational and educational advancement. The organization also helps to equip community organizations to provide assistance and advocacy, and also works to improve systems that have historically marginalized refugees and other immigrants. That work has uniquely prepared her for her work with the City and County, which includes many of those same goals.

Operational Budget Funds of \$72,800

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to authorize the County Manager to enter into a contract of \$72,800 with Insight Global-a staffing agency-- to obtain the services of an additional IS&T Help Desk contractor to supplement the services provided by the help desk staff. The approved funding is from the current fiscal year 2021-2022 operational budget.

This contracted position will join IS&T's Technical Support Analyst team and support the productivity of County employees as they telework during the COVID-19 pandemic. This contractor will answer phone calls from employees, create service tickets, resolve issues, and help ensure employees have appropriate access to County information networks.

The IS&T Client Services team is responsible for all first and second-level IT support and manages capital improvement projects for all Life Cycle Replacement of client systems (desktop, laptops, phones, tablets) and Audio Video equipment. Monthly, the IS&T Client Services team of four Technical Support Analyst receives over 1,000 requests for incident repair or services and over 400 phone calls for direct support. The team is in the process of ordering 400 replacement client systems that will increase the team's workload as these new systems are prepared and deployed. This additional position will enable the Client Services team to continue providing the current level of support to County employees as this additional work is done.

Approval to Extend Project Manager Contract with "The Select Group" for Capital Project-IST Hardware and Services by \$90,000 to a total of \$129,999

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to authorize the County Manager to approve the extension of an existing contract with "The Select Group" which will increase the current contract amount by \$90,000 to a total of \$129,999 for project management of the IS&T Hardware and Services Capital Project. Funding for this contract increase will come from available funding within the capital project. This contract will extend into FY 2022-2023.

This project manager will work within the IS&T Project Management Office and primarily manage a new capital project for IS&T Hardware and Services. This project will focus on modernizing hardware and software for Durham County Government as a part of planned infrastructure enhancements. These enhancements will improve operational efficiencies and service delivery effectiveness. The Board approved funding for this capital project on June 28, 2021. The current budget for this project is \$7,056,360.

21-0741 Extension of the 2022 Listing Period for Business Personal Property

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to delegate authority to the Tax Assessor to grant individual extensions for the listing of business personal property upon written request showing good cause that an extension should be granted. Extensions would extend the listing period until no later than April 15, 2022.

Under G.S. 105-307, the period during which property is to be listed for taxation each year shall begin on the first business day of the month of January, and, unless extended as provided by statute, shall continue through the month of January. The Board of Commissioners shall grant individual extensions of time for the listing of personal property upon written request and for good cause shown. The request must be filed with the Tax Assessor no later than the ending date of the regular listing period. The Board may delegate the authority to grant extensions to the Assessor.

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No.22BCC00055 to recognize \$259,469 of NC Department of Transportation (NCDOT) Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) funds in Transportation.

The NCDOT Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) provides state operating assistance funding for trips in Durham County. The ROAP program provides trips for elderly and disabled residents, employment-related trips, and trips for rural residents. These state funds were eliminated in the FY21 state budget but have been restored in FY22. NCDOT issued a call for applications this fall. Durham County applied, and NCDOT has granted the County \$259,469 for eligible trip costs. These grant funds need to be recognized and appropriated in the FY22 budget through this amendment.

Budget Ordinance Amendment No.22BCC00056 to Recognize \$83,960.25 for Year One of a Three-Year US Department of Justice Grant to the Criminal Justice Resource Center for the Mental Health Court Expansion Initiative

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No.22BCC00056 recognizing \$83,960.25 for the first year of a three-year grant award from the US Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance. The funding will be used for the Mental Health Court Expansion Initiative.

The US Department of Justice awarded a three-year grant to Durham County and the Criminal Justice Resource Center to enhance and expand the Mental Health Court Diversion Program. The first year of the grant is set aside for planning. The second and third years of the grant are dedicated to program implementation. A Planning and Implementation Guide must be completed in year one and approved by US DOJ before funding for the second and third years will be released. The total federal funding award is \$467,696.

The Durham County Criminal Justice Resource Center will collaborate with the Durham County District Attorney's Office and the Courts to enhance the capacity of the existing Mental Health Court Diversion Program and align with best practices.

Bull City Financial Services (BCFS) Contract Amendment

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve a contract amendment with Bull City Financial Services (BCFS) to increase the contract amount \$125,100, taking the original contract amount from \$39,900.00 to \$165,000. BCFS is the Office of Emergency Services - EMS Division's third-party collections company for delinquent payments.

The County entered into the initial contract with BCFS in January 2021 in the amount of \$39,900. The contract was amended on July 1, 2021 to extend the contract period to June 30, 2022. This contract amendment adds \$125,100 to the existing contract for a total amount not to exceed \$165,000. The lower original contract amount can be attributed to the lack of experience with the contractor and their ability to collect delinquent payments on our behalf of the OES - EMS Division. Having gained more experience working with the contractor to date, it has become apparent that an increase in the contract amount is warranted.

The contract primary placement fee is 17% for recent delinquent accounts and the secondary placement fee (these are harder to collect delinquent accounts that were

transferred to BCFS from our previous collections vendor) is 25%. Projecting the remainder of the contract period through June 30, 2022 (6 months), it is estimated that the total contract primary placement fee amount will be approximately \$165,000. Funding by fees for this contract are based off of actual collections once the invoices have been reconciled.

Conservation Easement Option with Clara Glenn for 12721 Hampton Road

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve an option to purchase a farmland conservation easement with Clara Glenn at 12721 Hampton Road, to use current open space capital project funds to support 50% of the cost of the easement, and to authorize the Manager to execute the federal ALE grant agreement if funds are awarded. The Glenn farm consists of 40.5 acres (parcel #190919) located at 12712 Hampton Road in northern Durham County, east of Rougemont and south of Red Mountain Road. The Glenn farm was originally owned by Lucius Glenn, who was the patriarch of the extended Glenn family that owns multiple properties along Hampton Road; two of the cousins, Mr. Douglas Daye and Mr. Alston Glenn, have also protected their farms with a conservation easement with Durham County (see Attachment 2). The Glenn Farm also includes the historic Bowling-Glenn House, which was listed on the Durham Historic Inventory. The Durham Farmland Protection Advisory Board recommended approval of a farmland easement on the Glenn farm at their November 2021 meeting.

This year's federal Agricultural Lands Easement Program (ALE) program cycle has a submission deadline on January 14, 2022. For farms to be eligible for consideration of the program grant funds, the County needs to have a signed commitment (real estate option) between the county and the owner signaling the owner's intent to move forward with the easement if funding is approved. The real estate option gives the County the right but not the obligation to close on the easement. Conservation

easements are a cost-effective way to permanently protect farmland since the property remains in private ownership, but the county holds the development rights. An attachment explains how the values of conservation easements are determined. To date, Durham has permanently protected over 2367 acres on 20 farms. Of these farms, 17 were protected using federal farmland grant funds, and Durham County has been fortunate to have been awarded over \$7.6 million in federal funds since 2005 towards conserving permanent farmland in Durham County (counting both completed and pending projects).

If awarded, the federal ALE grant funds would be used to pay for 50% of the approved appraised value for the acquisition of the conservation easement. The county's estimated total costs for the easement including 50% of the easement value, survey, appraisals, and closing costs should be no more than \$180,000. The County's open space and farmland capital project account has sufficient funds to pay for the county's portion of the Glenn easement project, so no additional funding is needed for these easements. If an ALE grant is awarded and the easement moves forward, a final budget for the farm easement and county's costs would be brought back to the Board prior to closing. The grant funds are not paid until the time the easement on the farm is conveyed.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: The acquisition of farmland conservation easements for permanent open space directly supports the County's Strategic Plan Goal #4 Environmental Stewardship, Outcome Measure #4 which is: "Number of total acres of open space and farmland that have been protected/ influenced by Durham County." Protection of permanent farmland also supports water quality protection goals and helps to preserve rural character, two other Goal 4 objectives.

Request from Durham County ABC Board for Flexibility with General Manager Salary

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to review and approve the attached request from the Durham County ABC Board.

The Durham County ABC Board is in the process of hiring a new general manager. State law stipulates that if the salary of the ABC Board's general manager will exceed the salary of the local Clerk of Court, the ABC Board must receive permission for the salary from the appropriate Board of County Commissioners. Though the ABC Board is still in the process of advertising the position, the feedback they have received from several outside consultants concludes that they may need to be able to offer a salary higher than that of the local Clerk of Court. More details on their rationale and situation are included in the attached letter from Durham County ABC Board Attorney.

Given the importance of a high-functioning and well-managed ABC system to our county's economy, staff are supportive of the local ABC Board having authority to negotiate the salary for the current ABC Board's General Manager search. Staff have provided the ABC Board the General Manager salary range as a framework for this decision that aligns with the market salary range. This authorization only applies to the existing general manager search. In February 2022, staff will bring a recommendation to the Board of County Commissioners that outlines a permanent

approach for salary setting when establishing the ABC Board General Manager salary.

The Snow Hill Road Pump Station (SHRPS) was identified as a limiting factor in growth of the Treyburn business district in 2013. Although the SHRPS was upgraded in 2015, the pump station is no longer capable of being upgraded to sufficiently convey wastewater from the Treyburn business district and must be replaced with a larger station and separate force main. Although Phase 1A of the SHRPS is nearly complete with construction, the existing 12-inch force main will be utilized until completion of Phase 1B which includes the proposed 20-inch force main. During design, it was projected the pump station would provide a firm capacity of 2,450gpm utilizing the existing 12-inch force main and was estimated to sustain growth for 3 to 5-years. While performing acceptance testing of the new pump station, the condition of the existing force main is yielding a lower firm capacity of approximately 2,000gpm. Although an incremental increase of approximately 800gpm will be achieved with the new pump station, the growth of multiple industries in Treyburn business park appears to be outpacing the estimated lifespan of this increase.

Although Durham County economic development was a driving factor behind the expansion of this pump station, consideration was given to the County residents of the nearby Cabin Branch region as well. This region consists of residential landowners facing deteriorating soil conditions causing septic systems to be nearing the end of their lifespan. Extension of sanitary collection system through this region will allow decommissioning of these failing septic systems and will reduce or eliminate the environmental impacts in the downstream tributaries and lakes.

On August 26, 2019, the Board approved Capital Project Amendment No. 20CPA000002 in the amount of \$12,685,000 as well as the design-build contract execution with Wharton-Smith/Hazen and Sawyer. The Board has previously approved GMP#1 on May 11, 2020, GMP#2 on October 12, 2020, and GMP#3

on May 24, 2021. GMP #4 Contract Package consists of permitting the previously completed force main construction documents, easement acquisition, and construction of the force main. In an attempt to solicit the greatest feedback from the construction industry, the project will be advertised on major construction bidding platforms and to all qualified MWBE contractors.

The City has recently indicated they will participate in the costs associated with this element of the project. Staff requests that the BoCC move this item forward today to support our economic development goals as well as the timing needs of our partners this facility serves. The County and City Managers will return in March 2022 with a proposed cost-sharing agreement.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: This action is in accordance with Durham County Strategic Plan Goal 4: "Environmental Stewardship and Community Prosperity," as this project will ensure a quality delivery of the Snow Hill Road Pump Station to promote economic development.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 22BCC00057 appropriating \$400,000 of General Fund fund balance and approve a \$431,500 contract with Durham Congregations in Action (DCIA) to provide food security grants to emergency food assistance organizations.

Emergency food assistance organizations have been supporting Durham County residents at a heightened level for 21 months and need immediate funding for food, infrastructure, supplies, and other items. Because of a reduction in federal aid (i.e., food and funding) in the summer of 2021, the Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina had to cut food pantry deliveries in half. This left a significant gap in support for organizations supporting families most impacted by COVID-19. County funding for home delivered meals for food insecure seniors and other medically vulnerable populations has been extended until March 31, 2022; however, funding for fresh produce boxes for emergency food assistance ended August 31, 2021. No other County programs exist to support continued emergency food security efforts.

To address this issue, we request that the Board approve \$400,000 in funding to support emergency food assistance organizations with food, infrastructure, materials/supplies, and other operational funding needs; and we additionally request approval to expend \$31,500 from the FY22 food security budget for operating costs for the management of the program. This allocation is designed to address the uptick in families reliant on emergency food assistance. All funds will be disbursed and spent by June 30, 2022. Ongoing food security needs are being considered in the FY2023 budget and ARPA process and may need to be discussed at a future Board meeting.

The grant program will be operated by DCIA, a local nonprofit organization with experience managing grant programs. DCIA's mission is to work with communities of diverse faith "for racial justice, social equity, and human dignity." In FY21, they were awarded a County nonprofit grant to operate a mini-grant program totaling \$60,000. For this mini-grant program, 73% of recipient organizations were led primarily by Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) staff and/or boards and 94% of recipient organizations reported serving primarily BIPOC communities.

Within the program, funding will be split into large and small grant opportunities, approximately \$250,000 in grants up to \$60,000 and \$150,000 in grants up to \$10,000. The application process will encourage collaborative proposals and partnership. Funds will be targeted to support communities disproportionately impacted by the negative economic impacts of COVID-19, including BIPOC communities, parents of young children, and low-income workers.

All grantees will be required to attend an onboarding webinar, distribute information to food recipients about SNAP (Food Stamps) and WIC, and submit interim and final narrative and financial reports to the contractor. Grantees will also be asked to provide data to support possible FEMA reimbursement. County staff will prepare an online survey for grantees to promote with food recipients to help organizations better serve their participants and help County staff better understand food insecurity in Durham County.
