22-0579 Introduction of New City-County Immigrant and Refugee Affairs Coordinator (10min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to meet the new City-County Immigrant and Refugee Affairs Coordinator, Kokou Nayo (Nayo), and welcome him to Durham County Government and to the important work of supporting our community's immigrant and refugee residents.

Created jointly by the Durham County Board of County Commissioners and Durham City Council, this is a shared position serving both the City of Durham and Durham County. The City-County Immigrant and Refugee (IR) Affairs Coordinator is responsible for driving county- city- and community-wide efforts around immigrant and refugee affairs initiatives and practices in the County and City, developing and maintaining collaborative partnerships with organizations and individuals, and supporting IR teams, workgroups, and task forces. The position is based at and supported by Durham County Cooperative Extension.

Kokou Nayo joined Durham County in August 2022 as our new City-County Immigrant and Refugee Affairs Coordinator where he facilitates successful integration of immigrants and refugees into Durham's civic, economic, and cultural life. Previously, Nayo worked with Church World Service as Refugee Community Organizer leading their community engagement, refugee and immigrant leadership training, and advocacy efforts. Nayo comes to Durham County with a vast knowledge and experience on refugee and immigrant issues in Durham and NC. Nayo is appointed as a member of the NC Financial Literacy Council by Governor Roy Cooper to represent immigrants and refugees. He holds a Masters in community management and policy practice from UNC-Chapel Hill School of Social Work. Originally from Togo, West Africa, Nayo calls Durham home since 2017.

Easements Necessary for the New Northern High School

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve the attached Easement Agreement and Dedication Plat with Duke Energy Carolinas, LLC (DEC) for (2) electrical power easements for the new Northern High School located at 4622 N. Roxboro Street. (See attachment 1 - pages 1 - 11)

The agreement will grant access to Duke Energy to install and service the electrical transformers necessary for the new Northern High School site currently under construction. The easement agreement is required by DEC to construct and maintain the electrical facilities which are required to power the new facilities. The dedication plat includes two proposed variable width easements consisting of 0.988 acres/43,021 S.F. (easement 1) and 1.067 acres/46,470 S. F. (easement 2) respectively.

The County Attorney's Office has reviewed the Easement Agreement and Dedication Plats which is attached for the Board's reference.

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 23BCC00029 Cooperative Extension to Recognize \$167,015 in Grant Funding from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to conduct a feasibility study of "Durham County Farm Campus"

Durham County Cooperative Extension applied for funding from the USDA NRCS' Urban Agriculture and Innovation Production (UAIP) planning grant in July 2021 and was awarded \$167,015 to conduct a feasibility study of "Durham County Farm Campus."

This planning project aims to support a more resilient food system that systemically addresses the root causes of food insecurity. The grant will fund a feasibility study to examine partnerships, priorities, and phasing of a Durham County Farm Campus, as well as support an in-depth study of how the Farm Campus can best meet community needs and goals. This study should clarify optimal location, acreage, and facility needs for a Farm Campus. Currently, there is no similar initiative in Durham County to support new and beginning farmer access to land and to support racial equity in farming. While the concept of a Durham County Farm Campus has been under discussion for several years, the USDA grant will enable Durham County to thoroughly examine the feasibility of the idea and consider possible plans for future implementation.

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 23BCC00037 appropriating \$376,800 of ARPA Fund fund balance to support an increase in funding for the contract with Mako Medical Laboratories, LLC for employee COVID-19 testing. Also, the Board is requested to approve a contract amendment with Mako Medical Laboratories, LLC increasing the contract "not to exceed" amount to \$376,800. Mako Medical Laboratories, LLC provided a response to RFP 21-013R1 requesting vendors for both bi-weekly and mass testing for employees, if warranted. Mako Medical will provide both bi-weekly testing for employees working in confined living spaces, including the Detention Center, and mass testing up to and including the entire workforce, 2000+ individuals, if warranted. Through the RFP process they have outlined a strategy to provide personnel which will provide testing and results to employees. ARPA funds will be used to offset the expense.

This contract will extend to the end of the FY 2022-23 fiscal year.

22-0558 Detention Center Ballistic Glass Replacement Project

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve a contract with Jacobs Glass in the amount of \$236,589.06 to replace windows broken by vandalism and upgrade unbroken panes with ballistic glass at the Durham County Detention Center. Staff deliberated over multiple materials for the repair, with the ballistic glass offering the most security, while keeping the existing structure appearance and design. Although the title states glass, the product is a laminated plexiglass material. The ballistic glass will be susceptible to scratching but not breaking or shattering like the existing materials.

The current recommendation has been reviewed by the original building architecture. The recommendation has been deemed as the most cost-effective approach, while also maintaining the security and integrity of the building. Further, the application will pass the State inspectional certification.

Jacobs Glass was selected to complete the repair for this project due to previous ballistic glass replacements at the Detention Center. The company will provide all material and labor needed for the glass replacement. Funds to over this expense, will occur from the current Detention Center Cell Window Replacement capital project.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: This project aligns with Goal-5 Accountable: Efficient and Visionary Government and Goal 3-Safe and Secure Community. These partner Goals address unsafe conditions, protect life and property, and respond to emergencies. The installation of ballistic glass will mitigate any future attempt by vandals to break the windows and improve security of the facility and tenants.

Board Acceptance/Endorsement of Certain Perpetual Use and Access Easements at HUB Park Center

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to accept/endorse certain perpetual public access and use easements and parking easements related to certain amenities at the HUB Park Center development in part funded by the County in partnership with Research Triangle Foundation (RTF). The Board is also requested to authorize the County Manager to execute any necessary items related to this matter on behalf of the County and Board.

The County and the Foundation entered into an initial "Agreement for Park Center Phase I Public-Private Projects" dated October 12, 2015, then amended the initial agreement via the Revised First Amendment to Agreement for Park Center Phase I Public-Private Projects" dated April 17, 2019 (as amended, the "PPP Agreement"). These agreements specified that the County would provide \$20 million in project funding to help support and facilitate construction of certain infrastructure elements including sidewalks, walking/jogging trails, parking facilities, and other elements with the condition that these amenities and infrastructure be available to the general public in perpetuity.

The attached Access & Use Easement which also includes a Parking Easement Agreement has now been provided by Michael G. Winters, Esq. and Tom Blue, Esq., on behalf of RTF. These documents were provided to the County Attorney's Office and have been found to be in order. A map/plat is also attached providing an illustrative view of what is intended by RTF to meet the requirements of the PPP agreements.

Should the Board endorse and accept the proposed easements, there is no additional fiscal impact to the County as the documents explicitly state the County shall not bear any liability for maintenance of the noted facilities.

Second Public Hearing and Resolution Regarding Durham County's Application for CDBG Neighborhood Revitalization Funds (10min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to conduct the required second public hearing on this matter and also to approve the attached resolution.

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Neighborhood Revitalization Program, part of the NC Department of Commerce, offers non-entitlement entities (such as Durham County) the opportunity to tailor projects to meet the community development needs specific and most critical to their locality, primarily for low- and moderate-income residents. The NC Neighborhood Program incorporates several previous Rural Economic Development Division (REDD) Community Development Block Grant programs and activities such as Scattered Site Housing and Supportive Housing. In 2018 the proposed projects included home repair and potentially also the repair of failing septic systems.

Working through the Triangle J Council of Governments (TJCOG), Durham County applied for such a grant in the 2018 cycle but did not receive funding. For this 2022 cycle, Durham County is eligible for up to \$950,000 and will again apply through a partnership with TJCOG and Rebuilding Together of the Triangle, a local non-profit the County has had a positive working relationship with for many years. The County will offer a \$100,000 local match to strengthen its application. Any funds received would have to be spent outside the City limits because the City of Durham is an entitlement agency, which means they receive CDBG funds annually as a matter of course.

Two public hearings are required prior to this application being submitted to the NC Department of Commerce on Sept. 30th. The first public hearing, to receive input on desired project activities, was held by the Board of County Commissioners at their Sept. 10th, 2022 meeting. The purpose of this public hearing is to communicate and receive feedback on a proposed plan of work if Durham County receives this grant.

Alignment with Strategic Plan: Offering a wide variety of forms of housing assistance, including repair, is important to maintaining a decent, affordable housing stock and slowing rates of displacement.

22-0563 Railroad Crossing Elimination Grant Application for Plum Street, Driver Street, and Ellis Road (10min)

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to receive an update on a Railroad Crossing Elimination grant application for the Plum Street, Driver Street, and Ellis Road crossings in East Durham and authorize the Chair to sign a letter of support for the grant application.

The Board of Commissioners received an update from GoTriangle staff on the Greater Triangle Commuter Rail study at the September 6, 2022, work session. The presentation described the challenges of the project including infrastructure needs and cost increases. One of the major themes of the discussion at the work session was a desire to pursue federal grant opportunities for the infrastructure elements of the project. There is an opportunity to seek federal grant funding through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law for rail and transit projects. These grant programs could potentially fund infrastructure elements of the project such as grade separations, new bridges, additional track, etc. to reduce the capital cost of the commuter rail project. These grant programs may provide as high as an eighty percent (80%) federal share for project elements.

GoTriangle, NCDOT, and Durham County staff have considered options and identified a potential grant application for the Railroad Crossing Elimination program. The application is due October 4, and Durham County would be the applicant. The application would be for a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA)/planning study for the potential closure of the railroad crossings at Plum and Driver Streets, including mitigation for those closures that may include new grade-separated crossings or other amenities, and a potential grade separation at Ellis Road. The purpose of the NEPA/planning study is to identify alternatives, evaluate impacts, identify mitigation measures, and develop consensus around the preferred alternative. The "No Build" option will also be considered. Public and stakeholder engagement will be critical for the success of this study.

<u>Alignment with Strategic Plan:</u> The Railroad Crossing Elimination grant would facilitate the improvement of the railroad and roadway network in East Durham to improve safety, reduce traffic delay, and provide better multi-modal connectivity in support of several Strategic Plan goals

The Equalization and Review Board shall be exempt from these term limits.
