Ordinance Amendment No. 24BCC00005 to Budaet recognize \$250,000 in Grant Funding for the 2022 Byrne **Discretionary** Community **Project** Funding/Byrne **Discretionary Grants** Program 2 (BJA).

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested Budget Ordinance Amendment to approve No.24BCC00005 recognizing \$250,000 from the 2022 Byrne Discretionary Community Project Funding/Byrne Discretionary Grants Program 2 (BJA) to the Community Intervention and Support Services department.

The project will be conducted in three parts: a 2- day conference, a collaborative descriptive analysis research project with North Carolina Central University Juvenile Justice Institute, and post-conference Community Conversation Sessions.

The Community Safety Conference will be held on August 22-23, 2023. The goal of the conference is to bring together leading experts, advocates, and practitioners to share insights, struggles, and opportunities in a communal space devoted to advancing the field of community violence intervention. We believe in the

transformative work of community organizations and the strategies that break cycles of gun violence. Through a variety of activities-including Racial Equity trainings, panel discussions, and more-we aim to provide a collaborative and informative environment for all.

North Caroline Central University Juvenile Justice Institute (NCCU-JJI) will partner with Durham County Community Intervention & Support Services Department (CISS) for a research project focusing on the 3 community interventions that comprise this department: Bull City United, My Brothers' Keeper, and Project BUILD. The project will consist of a descriptive analysis of the nature and impact of these programs in the Durham community, in light of interests in promoting community safety, reducing violence, and promoting well-being for the county's youth and young adult population. NCCU-JJI staff will conduct a review of the research literature and will work directly with project staff from each of the three community intervention programs to describe implementation, outcomes, and future directions. As each of the programs is based on a particular intervention model, NCCU-JJI will examine data from other communities to highlight the unique successes found in Durham County. This work will benefit the Durham community by providing information on local violence prevention efforts and helping to identify current strengths and future needs. The information provided in the final report will anchor Durham's efforts to work underway regionally, at the state level, and nationally around prevention of community and youth violence. The present collaboration sets the stage for the pursuit of future research and collaboration opportunities, including future grant applications. In addition, the present project will provide NCCU-JJI with an important student training experience that could set the stage for internships and employment opportunities related to this important work in Durham County.

Through partnerships with networks, community conversation sessions can build power for community safety, with a focus to advance policies and practices that embed equity in local solutions, articulate the metrics that drive accountability of government to communities, and inform a growing movement for community safety through solutions through system transformation. Local efforts will be connected in support of a common agenda of safe and equitable communities. Progress will be evaluated and adapted based on the data and accountability to community. The community conversation sessions will be an invaluable opportunity for people committed to saving lives from community violence to come together, share best practices, and advocate for change

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 24BCC00004 recognizing \$226,600 for Year One of a Three-Year North Carolina Department of Public Safety Grant to the Durham County Sheriff's Office for Medication-Assisted Treatment at the Durham County Detention Center. Subsequent years will be budgeted during the annual budget process, not to exceed \$458,700.

This funding will increase opioid use disorder treatment and add support for individuals suffering from alcoholism by introducing Vivitrol into the treatment program.

North Carolina continues to experience the harmful effects of the opioid epidemic. Researchers examined rates of fatal drug overdose among justice-involved individuals in North Carolina and found opioid overdose mortality rates more than 40 times higher than the general population. Those rates were highest during the first two weeks following release from custody.

In accordance with Session Law 2021-180, the North Carolina Department of Public Safety (DPS) is soliciting applications from Sheriffs' Offices to establish, expand or maintain medication-assisted treatment (MAT) programs of non-opioid, long-acting, injectable medication for the treatment of alcohol and/or opioid use disorder as part of reentry programming in county jails.

The Home and Community Care Block Care Grant (HCCBG), as authorized in G.S. 143B-181.1 (a) (11), is designed to improve the planning and coordination of in-home and community-based services provided to North Carolina's older adults. It is also intended to promote the visibility of aging programs at the local level by giving counties increased flexibility with respect to funding aging services available through the Block Grant. Most of the funding comprising the HCCBG is authorized by the federal Older Americans Act. There are federal mandates and priorities established by the Older Americans Act. However, the legislation provides for state and local discretion in the funding of services and program.

The Board is also requested to approve the Department of Social Services request to recognize Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) Funds subsequently to adoption of the FY2023-2024 Budget. The Department (DSS) and the Durham Center for Senior Life (DCSL) are co-lead agencies for receiving the HCCBG funds and administering the programs. The goal of services provided under this grant is to enable recipients to stay at home longer; receiving the care and services they need in their own homes, thus reducing the necessity for out of home placement. Services provided are Adult Day Care Services, Congregate Meals, Senior Center Operations, Information and Case Assistance, Transportation, Home Delivered Meals, and In-Home Aide Services.

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 24BCC000006 appropriating \$450,000 of General Fund fund balance to provide full funding for Durham Pre-K in FY 2023-24.

The Board of Commissioner's approved a contract with Child Care Services Association to continue to administer Durham Pre-K at the June 26th, 2023, meeting. This technical amendment ensures the funds are available to fully encumber the contract (\$6,857,581).

In FY 2022-23 the Board of Commissioner's approved a budget amendment to increase Pre-K funding by \$450,000 due to changes in the reimbursement policy at the Division of Child Development and Early Education. When the FY 2023-24 budget was developed, it was not specified this would be an ongoing increase to the Pre-K budget. It is now established this is part of the core County commitment, so this amendment fully funds the Pre-K contract with Child Care Services Association.

<u>Alignment with Strategic Plan:</u> A robust universe of early childhood programs, including universal pre-K, has great potential to improve outcomes across all outward-facing goals in the Durham County Strategic Plan.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to authorize the County Manager to enter into a contract with McGuire Woods Consulting to provide lobbying services for the current General Assembly session.

Increasingly, most urban counties are seeking the services of professional lobbying groups to enhance results achieved from state legislatures. The results of having subject matter experts available to attend legislative committee meetings and sessions are immense. With the benefit of having trained professionals in the building, local governments are able to improve their success rates related to the passage of local bills and receive added state funding for crucial capital and infrastructure projects and other services.

Following intensive interviews with two local lobbying firms, staff recommends the Board move forward to authorize the County Manager to approve a contract with McGuireWoods Consulting.

This consultant will provide weekly reports and help maintain positive communications with the Commissioners, staff and the Durham Delegation.

The Board is hereby requested to authorize the County Manager to enter into a contract with Samet/WC Construction Joint Venture (SWC) for the Pre-Construction Services for the Board of Elections S. Roxboro Renovations capital project located at 3825 S. Roxboro Street, in the amount not to exceed \$99,350.00. (See Attachment 1, Pages 1-3).

The Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for Construction Manager at Risk Services for the Board of Elections S. Roxboro Renovations capital project was advertised in local newspapers on March17, 2023. A pre-proposal conference was held on March 23, 2023 and five proposals were received on April 17, 2023. A Selection Committee comprised of representatives from RND Architects, General Services and Engineering Departments reviewed the proposals. (See Attachment 2, Page 1). The selection committee short listed and interviewed two firms, then deemed the team of Samet/WC Construction the most qualified team for the project. The Pre-Construction Services phase of the project is the first step in the Construction Manager at Risk process in which the contracting team will provide cost estimates, constructability reviews, schedule development and value analysis of the project design. This initial contract is necessary for the C, M @ R to provide analysis of the schematic and design development of the project. Our intent is to follow-up with a contract authorizing the procurement of early packages to mitigate the long lead times and supply chain issues associated with electrical equipment and others prior to requesting a C, M @R contract for the final GMP.

The goal of the Board of Election's project is to renovate approximately 58,000 square feet of space at the Shoppes of Hope Valley (SHV) formerly used as a Kroger grocery store to house Durham County Board of Elections. The new facility will consolidate all of the Board of Election's operations within a single facility. The scope of work includes interior renovations, exterior façade improvements, roofing

replacement, and full building system replacements for the designated space.

As a reminder, the project will be designed and constructed in three phases to accommodate the desired move-in date, site planning and other regulatory approvals, and the availability of funding for future phases. Future phases include sitework, roof replacements and the rooftop HVAC unit replacements for the remainder of the strip shopping center located at 3825 South Roxboro Street.

This agenda item has been reviewed and approved by the Purchasing Division. In review of the M/WBE participation for this project, Samet/WC construction will be utilizing 20% (\$20,902) MWBE Participation with WC Construction Company for this portion of the project. The vendor has also committed to working with Durham County to seek additional M/WBE participation if the opportunity prevails. The funding for these services is included in the capital project account.
