A resolution of Durham County, North Carolina, supporting the America 250 NC committee for the United States semi-quincentennial (AMERICA250NC).

- WHEREAS, Roy Cooper, former Governor of North Carolina created AMERICA250NC to plan, encourage, develop, and coordinate the commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the United States and North Carolina's integral role in that event and the role of its people on the nation's past, present, and future; and

Commissioner Jacobs highlighted the report from staff about all the detention center improvements and repairs approved by the Board. Commissioner Burton asked when the detention center was built. Mr. Swiatocha replied the detention center was built in 1992-1993 and opened in 1994.
