The Board is requested to approve and authorize the County Manager to execute year-one of a three-year contract with SHI International Corp. in the amount of \$278,806.48 for licenses, services, and the enterprise agreement with Microsoft for the Durham County Sheriff's Office. The Board is also requested to authorize the County Manager/Sheriff to execute all subsequent renewals, not to exceed the total contract amount of \$836,419.44. Funding for year-one exists within the Sheriff's Office Operating Budget.

Volume licenses for email and services will be purchased through SHI for the Sheriff's Office, per the State Convenience Contract 208C. The Microsoft Enterprise Agreement supports DCSO's users across the suite of the Microsoft Applications and includes several cybersecurity capabilities to help protect the DCSO from Malware attacks, including failover capabilities as of result of it being Cloud-based. Software assurance is included in the Enterprise Agreement and provides a comprehensive range of benefits to help the DCSO plan, deploy, and use the latest Microsoft technologies and services. The Microsoft Enterprise Agreement keeps the DCSO in line with the shift to cloud services and best practices across private and government sectors including the City of Durham, Mecklenburg County, Wake County, Guilford County, and many other counties and municipalities throughout North Carolina.

Funding for this contract was budgeted in the FY24-25 budget process. Year-two and three will be budgeted during the budget process. G.S. 143-129(e) (7) allows local governments to be exempted from the competitive bidding requirements and purchase furnishings/equipment through contracts established by the North Carolina Department of Information Technology as provided in Article 15 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 25BCC083 recognizing \$124,106 from the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) for the 2024 State Criminal Alien Assistance Program (SCAAP) and allocate these funds to the Durham County Sheriff's Office.

SCAAP, administered by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), provides federal payments to states and localities that incurred salary costs for incarcerating undocumented noncitizens who have at least one felony or two misdemeanor convictions for violations of state or local law and who are incarcerated for at least four consecutive days during the reporting period. The Bureau of Justice Assistance has announced that Durham County is eligible for the 2024 SCAAP award in the amount of \$124,106.

In accordance with grant guidelines, the Durham County Sheriff's Office will purchase equipment for disaster preparedness and continuity of operations inside the Detention Center, support training and education for detention officers, and fund detention officer recruitment initiatives. The funds will also cover Southern Resource Advisors, LLC's costs to compile Detention Center population data. This annual grant appropriation has supported the Sheriff's Office operations for several years.

Approval of a Contract Amendment between the County of Durham and Diana Phillips Consulting in the amount of \$10,000.00, increasing the total amount to \$40.000.

Agenda Text:

The Board has been requested to approve the contract amendment between the County of Durham and Diana Phillips Consulting in the amount of \$10,000.00, increasing the total contracted amount to \$40,000. The term of the contract amendment remains the same from July 1, 2024, to June 30, 2025.

Durham County implemented a new recording imaging, and indexing system, Eagle Recorder by Tyler Technologies, for Real Estate and Vital Records in the office of the Register of Deeds. The purpose of the original contract was and remains for the coordination, management, review and finalization of digital records importation into our Tyler Technologies software database. As a result of the high-volume data transfer of 144 years of data, from the old system, there were portions of the

database which required incremental updating to be fully accessible to the public remotely.

Diana Phillips Consulting has served as the key consultant and project manager for the deeds office during this data conversion system enhancement. At a high level, Ms. Phillips has worked to ensure 1) the formatting and finalization of the data was successfully completed by U.S.

Imaging (vendor), 2) that Tyler Technologies' support staff accurately completed the preliminary system imports and updates, and 3) coordination with DCo IS&T to schedule and verify the final data uploads in accordance with cyber security best practices. These time-consuming though necessary final steps conclude the data migration and finally allow residents, financial institutions, etc. to remotely access the full breadth of the office's records efficiently. The delays caused by the issues with formatting have caused a shortage of funds due to the technical issues that had to be resolved.

The funds utilized for the project were approved in our 2024 budget and allocated from our Automation Restoration Fund (N C G S 161-11-1.), a non-reverting fund for the conservation and preservation of records in the Register of Deeds office, and do not require any additional funding budget requests.

Cooperative Extension staff and volunteers held a Briggs Avenue Fall Festival on September 7, 2024 to provide community garden education, demonstrations, compost give-a-way, and a plant sale of plants grown by volunteers at Briggs Avenue Community Garden to provide additional support for the program. The plants were priced to provide high-quality garden plants to the community at a modest price to enable community members to grow their own season-appropriate food. Funds raised will be utilized to support garden expenses, such as plants, seeds, tools, and other materials necessary for operating the garden.

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 25BCC080 Cooperative Extension to recognize \$1,000 from the Extension Master Food Volunteer Training for Family and Consumer Sciences for Program Expenses.

Cooperative Extension staff held a 5-week training series for the Extension Master Food Volunteer Program (EMFV) January 5- February 22, 2025. The funds were fees collected from 10 participants who, after training, will aid staff during nutrition education classes, culinary training, outreach programs and community events. The EMFV program uses evidence-based curriculum to train volunteers in teaching Durham residents healthy and delicious recipes to improve the home food environment. Durham Extension staff expect to train 10-15 volunteers each year for the next 5 years, resulting in an increased capacity to serve local residents. Funds raised will be utilized to support training activities for volunteers as well as educational materials and supplies for the Family and Consumer Science program.

Approval of Capital Project Amendment No. 25CPA0039 Appropriating \$186,649,809.10 of 2022 General Obligation Bond Funding to the New Durham School of Arts Project (SH299) Bringing the Total Project Budget to \$241,070,536

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Capital Project Amendment No. 25CPA036 appropriating \$186,649,809.10 of 2022 General Obligation Bond funding to the New Durham School of Arts project (SH299) bringing the total project budget to \$241,070,536. This additional funding provides full project funding Durham Public Schools to secure all construction related contracts and ensuring timely completion of the new school.

While the entire project budget will be available with this capital project amendment, it will take Durham Public Schools several years to spend down available funding. In the supplemental documentation a cash flow projection provides the expected timing of actual project related spending. Durham County will take on the debt payments related to the 2022 GO Bonds spent within this project over time, and has planned for this spending within its own capital financing plan. To date \$54,420,726.90 has been allocated towards this project, with the majority being from 2022 General Obligation Bonds.

The new Durham School of the Arts (DSA), located off Duke Homestead Rd. and Stadium Dr., will be a state-of-the-art campus spanning 337,500 Gross Square Feet (GSF). Designed to accommodate 2,000 students in grades 6-12, the school will feature an impressive 800-seat concert hall and a 500-seat theatre for performances. The campus will be organized around a central courtyard, with two stories of classrooms to foster a collaborative learning environment. In addition to its academic facilities, DSA will offer a range of athletic amenities, including softball and baseball fields, a football field, and a track. This dynamic, purpose-built space will support both academic excellence and artistic expression, providing students with the resources they need to thrive in a well-rounded educational setting.

As of early March 2025, the project is 6% complete with a scheduled completion date of October 2027, and estimated move in date of December 2027.
