

# Durham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council

## FY 2026-2027 Request for Proposals

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**The Durham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) is requesting proposals for fiscal year 2026-2027:**

The JCPC has studied the risk factors and needs of Juvenile Court involved youth in this County and hereby publishes this Request for Proposals. The JCPC anticipates funds from the NC Dept. of Public Safety Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention in the amount stated above to fund the program types specified below. Such programs will serve delinquent and at-risk youth for the state fiscal year 2026-2027 beginning on, or after, July 1, 2026. The use of these funds in this County requires a local match in the amount specified above. The County can approve programs for 1- or 2-year funding awards, dependent on County approval and programs meeting all requirements.

**System Flow Data (FY 24-25)**

- 244 juveniles received at intake in FY 24-25

**Complaint Data (FY 24-25)**

- 1181 complaints received, 1107 non-school based and 84 school-based offenses.
- Rate of 4.8 of complaints per juvenile (1181/244)

**The following data is representative of 308 juveniles who were processed at juvenile intake and administered the YASI Full Assessment.**

***Risk Level***

- Durham youth were more likely to be at moderate risk than State Average (SA). 54% vs 41%

***Legal History***

- 69% of youth assessed were for referrals with felonies vs. 35% for State Average
- 44% of youth assessed had previous weapon offenses vs. 18% State Average
- 36% of youth assessed had prior detention placement vs 20% for State Average
- 49% of youth assessed were for crimes against person vs. 41% for State Average

***Family Domain***

- 29% of youth assessed had runaway history vs. 21% for State Average
- Durham County youth assessed were more likely to have inadequate supervision, 24% vs 16%.

***School Domain***

- Only 31% assessed were attending school regularly vs. 57% for State Average
- Durham County youth had more unexcused absences than SA, 33% vs 19%
- 31% of Durham County youth assessed had school conflict vs 16% for SA

- Less police reports were filed on Durham County youth than State Average (5% for Durham vs. 22% for State Average)

#### ***Community/Peer Domain***

- 57% of youth at intake had negative/delinquent influences vs 46% for SA. Durham County youth were assessed to have lower gang involvement than in previous years

#### ***Alcohol/Drug Use Domain***

- 41% of youth assessed answered yes to using alcohol and drugs vs. 40% for State Average. 73% of those youth using alcohol and drugs were between the ages of 12-15.

#### ***Mental Health Domain***

- 23% of youth assessed were diagnosed with a MH Disorder vs 38% for State Average

#### ***Physical Health***

- Durham County youth assessed were less likely to have health insurance than SA, 22% vs 10% for SA

#### ***Aggression Domain***

- **217% of youth assessed displayed a weapon vs. 11% for State Average**
- **19% of youth assessed used a weapon vs. 8% for State Average**

#### **Applicants are being sought that are able to address items below:**

1. Program services compatible with research that are shown to be effective with juvenile offenders.
2. Program services are outcome-based.
3. The program has an evaluation component.
4. Program services detect gang participation and divert individuals from gang participation.
5. Awareness of and sensitivity to Racial Ethnic Disparity that exists in the County.
6. Programs are encouraged to provide effective programming that includes restorative justice practices.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

- Local public agencies, 501(c) (3) non-profit corporations and local housing authorities will be considered for funding.

**1) No Over Due Tax form (available at the above link), 2) Notarized DPS Conflict of Interest Statement (available at the above link), 3) the agencies Conflict of Interest Policy; and 4) Proof of 501(c) (3) status.**
- **Please note, while a 10% match is required, that matches provided can be inclusive of in-kind contribution.**
- All funded programs will be required to attend regular JCPC meetings/events and sponsored trainings.
