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| Urban Ministries of Durham (UMD) | UMD offers food, shelter, and case management to homeless men, women, and children. In collaboration with their case manager, each person makes a Housing Plan -- a series of goals that need to be accomplished to leave the shelter for their own apartment. People can stay in the shelter for one month with the possibility of an extension. Case managers offer referrals to partner service providers in the community who help with goals and provide physical health care and mental health care. The Workforce Development Program at UMD assists residents with building a resume, applying for jobs, preparing for interviews, and finding transportation to work. Resources available at the shelter include a clothing closet and food pantry, and breakfast, lunch and dinner are provided. | Families Moving Forward (FMF) | Families Moving Forward helps families in the crisis of homelessness find their way home. It provides temporary housing, case management, skills education, and connection to community resources to help parents and children thrive in stable homes. The facility currently provides emergency shelter and supportive services for up to three months. Case management staff meet with every family to set family goals that address educational, vocational, health, and emotional needs. Individuals with substance use disorder are referred for treatment and other services as needed. Case management is continued for up to 12 months after families exit the emergency shelter program to ensure guests' long-term stability and prevent returns to homelessness. | 300 N. 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| <p>Housing for New Hope (HNH): Supportive Housing</p> | <p>Housing for New Hope’s Supportive Housing programs offer short-term and long-term options that are community-based with partner landlords, as well as long-term options on HNH-operated campuses. Clients must be experiencing homelessness to qualify for short-term options. To qualify for long-term options, clients must have experienced long-term homelessness and have a disabling condition. Community-based options work with more than 30 partner landlords throughout the community to connect clients with appropriate units. Campus-based options currently include Andover Apartments and Williams Square Apartments. The program offers safe shelter, three meals a day, clean clothing, Biblical counseling, financial planning, vocational training, GED/education and employment assistance. The Victory Program is the Durham Rescue Mission’s 12-month holistic program designed to help people recover from substance use disorder and return to the workforce investing back into the community. The first phase of the Victory Program is a six-month period where residents receive in-depth instruction in areas critical to building a solid foundation of lasting success as they overcome substance use disorder. All classes are geared toward the message of hope through Christ and the reshaping of the paradigm of how to handle the pressures and pains of life. During the second phase of recovery, residents learn skills and trades they can incorporate into future careers. The Victory Program is the Durham Rescue Mission's 12-month holistic program designed to help people recover from substance use disorder and return to the workforce investing back into the community. The first phase of the Victory Program is a six-month period where residents receive in-depth instruction in areas critical to building a solid foundation of lasting success as they overcome substance use disorder. All classes are geared toward the message of hope through Christ and the reshaping of the paradigm of how to handle the pressures and pains of life. All residents can be provided with basic necessities like soap, deodorant, toothpaste, shaving razors, and clothing. Residents also have access to a community pantry. Victorious Outcomes provides a foundation for personal growth in a clean, calm, and supportive environment. The home is located in a wooded, scenic area 2 miles away from the nearest bus stop. Bicycles are provided for residents, if needed, in addition to assistance finding other forms of transportation. 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| Empower Transitional | Empower Transitional provides temporary, stable, supportive housing for men who are homeless, including formerly incarcerated men, men in recovery from substance use disorder, and elderly men with disabilities. Assistance is provided in obtaining healthcare, treatment for mental health issues, health insurance, and employment, including links to employers that hire convicted felons. Empower Transitional focuses on welcoming and helping people who are willing to change, regardless of their circumstances. Two houses are close to bus stops and transportation is provided to residents of the house for elderly disabled men. | Soft Life Co. Transitional Housing | Soft Life Co is a women-centered transitional housing program designed to support individuals navigating reentry from incarceration, aging out of group homes, homelessness or unstable housing, recovery from substance use or other mental health challenges, and recovery from difficult life transitions. Soft Life Co. also serves postpartum mothers, young mothers needing support, and their children age 5 and younger. The mission is to provide safe, stable, and nurturing housing that empowers women to rebuild their lives with dignity, structure, and opportunity. Supportive services provided include case management, transportation assistance for appointments and essential errands, hygiene items and other basic necessities, food support, assistance finding employment, peer support services, and life skills coaching. | Magnolia’s Recovery and Transitional House | Magnolia’s Recovery and Transitional House was founded on Christian ethics and beliefs with the purpose of providing a safe and structured environment for women over the age of 18 who are in recovery or in transition. In addition to women with a history of substance use, Magnolia’s also accepts women who are getting reestablished from homelessness, jail, or prison. It uses a therapeutic approach specific to individual needs and caters to the unique needs of those that are transitioning back into the community. The goal is to enable personal growth, provide a foundation of development for long term recovery, and improve the quality of life while becoming productive members of society. Residents are offered the opportunity to engage with community partners that provide substance use counseling, medication management, behavioral health services, financial counseling, and career services. | Triangle Residential Options for Substance Abusers (TROSA) | TROSA is a multi-year, peer-driven, residential program for people in recovery from substance use disorder. TROSA gives men and women the tools and support they need to be productive, recovering individuals. TROSA employs professional and clinical staff; on-site services for residents' primary health care needs and co-occurring mental health needs; and post-program services for graduates. Services are provided to every resident free of charge and include: housing, food, clothing, personal care items, counseling/mentoring, work-based vocational training, education, and continuing care. TROSA also helps participants find a job and housing for post-graduation life.
