Ceremonial Items

Acceptance of Best Workplaces for Commuters Designation for Durham County Government

Tobin Fried, Sustainability Manager announced that Durham County was recognized as the best workplace for commuters. She explained the benefits for employees courtesy of the Board and stated this was a national program.

Chair Jacobs thanked Ms. Fried for helping the County to achieve this effort.

Commissioner Reckhow presented the Chair with the award and stated Durham County scored the highest number of workplace commuters with Wake and Orange following behind. She added this focus began in the late 1990s and has flourished since then.

Recognition of Durham County's Engineering and Environmental Services Sedimentation and Erosion Control Program as the State of North Carolina's "2018 Local Program of the Year"

Jay Gibson, General Manager shared the details of the program. He stated this was the first time Durham County won the Local Program on the Year Award and recognized staff and those in attendance.

Julie Coco, State Sedimentation Specialist shared why Durham County was selected to win the award. She stated each year the control mission meet to select a program award winner. Ms. Coco explained an audit and review on open projects in Durham was conducted along with field visits of active projects. She concluded from those findings, Durham County was selected as the winner of the award.

Public Hearings

Public Hearing on the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 County Manager's Recommended Budget

Chair Jacobs opened the public hearing. She stated that due to the large number of citizens signed up to speak and asked everyone to limit their comments to two (2) minutes each.

The following citizens signed up to speak about supporting the Durham Public Schools proposed budget and support funding for the Community Schools Coordinator Positions: Antonio Jones; Kevin Primus; Millicent Rogers; Kayla McKoy; Crystal Rogers; Katie Kizzie; Nicholas Graber-Grace; Megan McCurley; Bryan Proffitt; John Davis; Nick Rotosky; Meg Goodhand; Alec Greenwald; Lucia Cerrantes; Jasmine Bowles; Alexa Goff; Shanon Schuster; Sarah Peveler; Caroline Bailey.

The following citizens signed up to seek funding and support of the Eviction Crisis in Durham County: Felicia Arriaga; Kevin McNameo; Angela Vick-Lewis

Shelly Green, President and CEO of Durham Convention and Visitors Bureau asked for a capital improvement request for the Durham County Memorial. She stated the funds would be used to purchase a hammer throw cage which would be used while hosting the Youth Championship in July 2019.

Rich Kells, Director of Development and Communications for Habitat for Humanity of Durham stated he was an advocate for affordable housing in Durham. He asked that the Board consider the renewal for Habitat for Humanity for the upcoming fiscal year.

Matthew Clark and Jurgen Henn both thanked the Board in advance for their support of Durham Technical Community College.

Brian Schneiderman, Spokesman for the Durham Living Wage Project expressed the need to support all Custodial wage increases.

Dr. E. L. Allison, discussed gentrification and grade level/school ratings amongst African American and Hispanic children. She also stated she supported the County Manager recommended budget but did not support a property tax increase.

Dick Ford, Chair of the Friends of Durham stated although he supported the Durham Public Schools, he asked the Board to approve the recommended budget by the County Manager.

Bryan Fox, Greater Durham Chamber of Commerce thanked Durham County for their continued support of Universal Pre-K.

Chair Jacobs closed the public hearing. On behalf of the Board, she thanked everyone for coming out to speak, support, listen and express themselves on the numerous topics discussed.
