Opening of Regular Session—Pledge of Allegiance

Agenda Adjustments

Commissioner Heron requested to add an item to the agenda to receive a report from the County Attorney in regards to the protest petition for the Jordan Lake critical area.

Chairman Page asked County Attorney Lowell Siler if he was prepared to respond to Commissioner Heron's request.

County Attorney Siler responded that if Commissioner Heron's comments are in relation to potential litigation, then the discussion must be held in closed session.

Commissioner Heron clarified her request, stating that she wished to receive an update on the County Attorney's research on the protest petition issue. She noted that her request was not regarding litigation.

Chairman Page stated that he would request that any issue raised that may be inappropriate for open session be moved to closed session.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow requested additional detail as to why the protest petition was deemed invalid due to an issue with the signatures.

Commissioner Bowser commented that he thought that the watershed issue had been resolved. He added that parameters are in place whereby a decision of the Board of County Commissioners can be appealed if an individual or party feels that they have been wronged. Commissioner Bowser agreed to hold a discussion on the issue in closed session.

Commissioner Heron reiterated her request to have the protest petition discussion added to the agenda for open discussion.

Chairman Page questioned whether the petition can be discussed in open session while litigation is pending on the issue.

Commissioner Heron inquired about the aforementioned litigation.

County Attorney Siler informed Commissioner Heron that he was informed a week prior that litigation was forthcoming.

Discussion ensued regarding the Board's duty to discuss the issue in open or closed session.

Commissioner Heron moved, seconded by Vice-Chairman Reckhow, to discuss the protest petition in open session.

The motion failed with the following vote:

Ayes: Heron and Reckhow Noes: Bowser and Page

Absent: Howerton

Chairman Page stated for the record that he voted against the motion due to current litigation concerning the matter. He added that to hold a discussion in open session would violate the Board's rules.

Commissioner Bowser remarked that he voted against the motion as litigation with Southern Durham Development Inc. is pending, which relates to the protest petition. He stated that as Commissioner Howerton was absent, it would not be fair to discuss a matter in which she took part.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow stated her position of requesting basic facts as to why the signatures resulted in an invalid protest petition. She noted that the language presented for the closed session was not specific to her and Commissioner Heron's requests as no litigation is in progress for the zoning matter.

Commissioner Bowser expressed concern with discussing the issue in Commissioner Howerton's absence.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow responded that Commissioner Howerton would also be absent at the next regular session.

Commissioner Bowser consented to discussing the matter further in closed session.

Chairman Page stated that he had been advised by the County Attorney to discuss the Southern Durham Development Inc. v. Durham County; Filed in Durham County Superior Court (File No. 09 CVS 004125) in closed session.

County Attorney Siler explained that while the protest petition and the Southern Durham Development Inc. lawsuit are related, a second potential litigation could be filed regarding the petition, resulting in independent actions.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow moved, seconded by Commissioner Bowser, to add a closed session to discuss Plan Amendment, Jordan Lake Critical Area (A0900004), Zoning Map Change—Jordan Lake Critical Area (Z0900009), and Southern Durham Development Inc. v. Durham County; Filed in Durham County Superior Court (File No. 09 CVS 004125) pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 143-318.11(a)(3).

Commissioner Heron asked if a lawsuit had already been filed in relation to the protest petition.

County Attorney Siler reiterated that he had been informed that litigation on the matter was forthcoming.

Chairman Page communicated that the County Attorney represents the County; therefore, the Board should take heed to his advisement.

The motion carried with the following vote:

Commissioner Heron read her statement into the record as follows:

"On October 12, this Board voted 3 to 2 to move the critical protected area boundaries around Jordan Lake. The measure passed because the Planning Department, after two days of scrutiny, deemed the citizen protest petition invalid, citing a failure of the petition to meet the 20% threshold.

This decision by the Planning Department has been challenged, and using the same methodology as the Planning Department, the Southern Environmental Law Center determined the petition exceeded the 20% threshold since portions of parcels were overlooked by the Planning Department. Next, the Planning Department and County Attorney looked at signatures, something that should have been done prior to our October 12 meeting. They found one questionable signature for a property so small it wouldn't have invalidated the petition and then called into question all of the signatures.

Late last Thursday, our County Attorney issued a statement declaring the protest petition invalid but would not disclose why it was invalid, only that he would defend this decision in superior court. I don't recall a time during my 26 years on this Board when a protest petition had received this degree of scrutiny and the response from our staff has been so ambiguous.

The avenue of a protest petition is a public process, and the hard-working taxpayers of Durham deserve to know why the Planning Department and the County Attorney have declared this petition invalid and why their tax dollars will be spent defending this decision. It is time to shine a light on what has been going on behind closed doors for the last two weeks, and it is time for our County Attorney to give the reasons for invalidating this petition

tonight in this public forum in the name of transparency and ethical government. Durham County's reputation in on the line, and the citizens of Durham deserve better; they deserve the truth.

I am sure that, as County Attorney, you believe government actions should be transparent and open to the public. In a recent press release, you alluded to multiple grounds for rejection of the Jordan Lake protest petition, yet you provided no specifics. Just what are these grounds?"

Chairman Page stated his regret for Commissioner Heron sharing the information in her statement and stated that her statement was inaccurate and unfair to the County Attorney. He explicated that the Board had received no more information than the public; therefore, he asked the public to be patient while details were being gathered.

Commissioner Heron explained that her statement was not disparaging to the County Attorney; her statement was targeted towards the process.

Commissioner Bowser mentioned that the Planning Department verifies the protest petition signatures and decides whether they are valid, which puts the Department at the forefront.

County Attorney Siler stated his belief in transparency. He explained his position as a County representative, in which he attempts to interpret the law to his best understanding so that he may defend any action filed against the Board of County Commissioners.

Commissioner Heron commented that the issue originated from the Planning Department.

Announcements

Chairman Page made the following announcements:

- "In Touch with Durham County", the Durham County television show, airs on Cable TV channel 8 at 8:00 a.m. and 12 noon daily, 5:00 p.m. on Mondays, and 6:00 p.m. Tuesday Saturday.
- All Durham County Library locations will be closed on Wednesday, November 11, for Staff Development Day. The libraries will reopen on Thursday, November 12, during regular business hours.
- Durham County's Juvenile Crime Prevention Council announces the Governor's Crime Commission 2010 Funding Cycle is underway. Grant applications are being sought in the "Juvenile Justice Planning" category. Deadline to apply is December 7 for this competitive process. Commissioner Bowser stated his plans to add an item to the agenda regarding the County's audit report on the Families First program. He expressed disappointment in details outlined in the audit report and in a story ran by The Herald-Sun in relation to the report. Commissioner Bowser mentioned that two former Durham County Department of Social Services Directors—Dan Hudgins and Sammy Haithcock—were not contacted by the County Auditor for their input on the program; therefore, he found the report "inconclusive". He added that he was informed of

several churches involved in the program, although the report indicated that no churches participated. Commissioner Bowser issued an apology to the churches for the report's neglect. He then beseeched newspaper reporters to further their research beyond a single report from the County before making accusations in their articles. He wished not to add the item to the agenda due to the previous addition per Commissioner Heron's request. He requested that a discussion on the Families First Audit be added to the November 23 Regular Session agenda.

Minutes

Chairman Page stated a request to pull the October 5, 2009 Worksession Minutes from the agenda.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow moved, seconded by Commissioner Bowser, to approve as submitted the October 12, 2009 Regular Session Minutes of the Board.

Commissioner Heron asked why the Minutes were requested to be pulled.

County Manager responded that he had been asked to review the Minutes as additional information needed to be included.

Proclamation for National Home Care and Hospice Month

Dee Blake, Director of Development, Duke Home Care and Hospice, thanked the Board for issuing the proclamation. She mentioned that Durham County currently has the only inpatient hospice facility in a 9-12-county region, which was opened in April 2009, located on Roxboro Road.

Chairman Page thanked Ms. Blake for the services provided to Durham citizens and presented her with the proclamation.

Appointment of Clerk to the Board—V. Michelle Parker-Evans

Chairman Page reported that the Board of County Commissioners met in closed sessions on October 6, 2009 and October 26, 2009 to consider the qualifications of and discuss the conditions of an initial appointment of a public officer pursuant to G.S. § 143-318.11(a)(6). A recommendation was made to appoint V. Michelle Parker-Evans as the new Clerk to the Board.

Chairman Page noted that Ms. Parker-Evans has 23 years of experience in local government serving in various positions for the City of Durham and Durham County Government, as well as experience with the City of Raleigh. In addition, Ms. Parker-Evans worked two years in Germany for the Federal Government as Management Liaison for the Department of State.

Commissioner Bowser moved, seconded by Commissioner Heron, to appoint Ms. Parker-Evans as Clerk to the Board effective November 30, 2009 at an initial salary of \$61,000.

<u>Durham Public Schools—Purchase of Property for New Elementary "F" and Capital Project Amendment No. 09CPA000011—Transfer Of 2008 2/3rds GO Bond Funds From DPS Land Project To New Elementary F project</u>

Hugh Osteen, Assistant Superintendent of Operational Services, Durham Public Schools, reported that on August 27, 2009, the Board of Education approved the selection and purchase of real property for New Elementary "F". He stated that the school site is funded by the 2007 Bond and does not include construction cost at this time. Mr. Osteen stated that the Board of Education wished to seek the County's approval of the purchase price. The purchase price is \$1,870,000, and an MAI appraisal has confirmed a value of \$2,938,000. The Board of Education reviewed its analysis and due diligence information and wished to present this to the Commissioners. Total expenditures would be \$1,950,000 to include surveys, testing and other required services. The matter was originally presented to the Board of County Commissioners at its October 5, 2009 Worksession. Action on the request was deferred pending answers to several questions from the Commissioners. Responses to the questions had been received and shared with the County.

Mr. Osteen noted that the current New Elementary "F" capital project has a budget of \$1,086,304 and would need additional funds transferred from the 2008 2/3rds GO Bond supported DPS Land Project in the amount of \$863,696 in order to provide the needed \$1,950,000.

Commissioner Heron inquired about the quantity of available land and rock removal from the land.

Mr. Osteen explicated the cost for rock removal and briefly discussed the blasting plan pre-construction.

Commissioner Bowser recapped a blasting occurrence when Martin Luther King Jr. Parkway was constructed, of which his home incurred damage and was never repaired. He communicated his concern that homes near the New Elementary School "F" site would sustain damage; however, he stated that he would support this item if the Board were assured that any home to incur damage from the blasting would be repaired.

In regards to Commissioner Bowser's concern, Mr. Osteen stated that liability coverage would be included in the contract to agree to repair any home that sustains damage from the blasting. He articulated that Durham Public Schools (DPS) would take ownership to any issues that may occur.

Commissioner Bowser remarked that he would vote against this item due to his concern and to protect the interest of the adjacent homeowners.

Mr. Osteen pointed out that it is unknown if blasting would be required until a technical analysis is performed.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow referenced No. 6, Ongoing Operational Costs, on the Land Acquisition Due Diligence Chart, which states, "Taxes and some minimal site landscape maintenance (HOA covenants)." She questioned why DPS would have to pay taxes.

Tim Carr, Program Director, Construction & Capital Planning, Durham Public Schools, explained that the term "taxes" was an oversight and should be excluded from the statement.

In relation to the New Elementary "F" site map, Vice-Chairman Reckhow suggested including measurement scales and proposed site indications on future site maps. She inquired about the distance from New Elementary "F" to W.G. Pearson Magnet Elementary, Southwest Elementary, Pearsontown Year-Round Elementary, Hope Valley Elementary, and Fayetteville Street Elementary Schools.

Mr. Osteen explained that the distance is one mile plus; however, the schools are over capacity. Therefore, New Elementary "F" must be located in close proximity. He opined that the redistricting would not be problematic.

Commissioner Heron spoke to her concern regarding transportation costs. She inquired about the overcrowding at Lakewood Elementary School. Commissioner Heron asked if any students who live in Hope Valley Farms attend Lakewood.

Mr. Osteen responded that the majority of Lakewood students reside in that district. He added that the proposed school would help reduce transportation costs.

Commissioner Heron expressed interest in discussing transportation costs during the Board's next meeting with the DPS Board of Education. She stated her concern that parents could be prevented from participating in school activities due to their children attending schools across the county.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow spoke highly of New Elementary "F" in regards to Commissioner Heron's concern. She mentioned the proposed walking zone and neighborhood pattern.

Commissioner Bowser inquired about New Elementary "F" serving the Southwest neighborhood.

Mr. Osteen responded to Chairman Page that the address for New Elementary "F" would be on South Roxboro Road. He added that the distance from the proposed site to Southwest Elementary would be over one mile.

Chairman Page asked if New Elementary "F" would be a traditional or year-round school.

Mr. Osteen responded that the Board of Education would determine the school's schedule at a later date.

Commissioner Bowser inquired about funding availability for the new school construction. He questioned whether DPS can afford to purchase the land.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow spoke in favor of land banking. She commented that she felt that purchasing land at a fraction of its appraised value and to gain a profit from its sale later would be a great buy. Vice-Chairman Reckhow requested that the County Manager provide the Board with an accounting of the current status of 2003 Bond expenditures and whether money was saved. She also expressed interest in holding discussions once the projects are closed out to consider using any leftover funds to offset a future Bond levy.

Commissioner Bowser referenced a discussion from the October 28 Budget Workshop where the County Manager mentioned a \$0.05 tax increase to pay current debt. He added that when the voters approve a bond referendum, they are authorizing the Board to impose a tax increase.

County Manager Ruffin replied to a question posed by Commissioner Bowser, stating that the funds for New Elementary "F" are part of the 2/3rds GO Bond to be used for land banking.

Commissioner Bowser disagreed with spending funds for a non-immediate need, considering the current state of the economy.

Commissioners held a discussion regarding the need for a new elementary school.

Commissioner Heron asked if the proposed site is adequate to support a middle school, if the need arose.

Mr. Osteen responded in the negative.

Vice-Chairman Reckhow moved, seconded by Commissioner Heron, to approve the request and purchase of real property for the New Elementary F school, and also approval of Capital Project Amendment No. 09CPA000011 moving \$863,696 of available 2008 2/3rds GO Bond funds from the DPS Land Project to the New Elementary F project, making its total budget \$1,950,000.

<u>Durham Open Space and Trails (DOST) Commission Matching Grants Funding</u> Recommendation

The Matching Grants Committee of the Durham Open Space and Trails Commission (DOST) decided to allow the prior year recommended but unfunded nonprofit community organization applicants for the Matching Grants Program to update their applications for assistance with recreational and open space projects. The Matching Grants committee and County staff reviewed the updated projects to ensure compliance with the program's goals and guidelines. The DOST approved the project and funding recommendation below at its October 21, 2009 meeting:

The recommendation to allocate \$77,175 of County funds represents a gain to the County of \$250,808 in matching funds as the projects' total proposed value is \$327,983. The Matching Grants program budget was approved in the FY2009-2010 Budget.

- Due to economic pressure on the County budget, funding was cut from this program prior to awarding the grants.
- For 2009, we allowed the groups that were recommended for funding to update their application.
- One of the four recommended projects declined the invitation to update due to their project was completed in conjunction with Durham Public Schools.
