#### 22-0488 Proclamation - October 2022 as National Cybersecurity Awareness Month

Vice Chair Jacobs read the following proclamation:

#### NATIONAL CYBERSECURITY AWARENESS MONTH | 2022

- **WHEREAS,** the Information Service and Technology recognizes that it has a vital role in identifying, protecting its citizens from, and responding to cybersecurity threats that may have significant impact to our individual and collective safety and privacy; and
- **WHEREAS,** critical infrastructure is increasingly reliant on information systems and technology to support financial services, energy, telecommunications, transportation, utilities, health care, and emergency response systems; and
- **WHEREAS,** cybersecurity education and awareness are crucial for everyone, including large corporations, small businesses, financial institutions, schools, government agencies, the home user, and anyone who connects to the internet; and
- WHEREAS, monitoring your accounts, being conscientious of what you share online, keeping computer software up to date, creating unique passwords and changing them regularly, installing anti-virus programs and firewalls, and using mobile devices safely are ways you can protect yourself from phishing, viruses, malware, financial loss, and loss of sensitive data; and
- WHEREAS, Gregory Marrow, CIO and his staff are dedicated to providing every individual and public and private organization in Durham County the resources necessary to ensure the understanding, implementation, and success of National Cybersecurity Awareness Month to help the citizens of Durham County stay safe online and connect with confidence; and
- WHEREAS, the STOP. THINK. CONNECT.™ Campaign serves as the national cybersecurity public awareness campaign, implemented through a coalition of private companies, nonprofit, government organizations, and academic institutions working together to increase the public's understanding of cyber threats and empowering Americans to be safer and more secure online; and
- WHEREAS, the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) Cybersecurity Workforce Framework is a free resource to help organizations (both large and small, public, and private) improve their cybersecurity practices through a practical approach to addressing the ever-evolving cybersecurity threats and challenges; and
- **WHEREAS,** maintaining the security of cyberspace is a shared responsibility in which each of us has a critical role to play, and awareness of computer security essentials will improve the security of Information Service and Technology's information, infrastructure, and economy; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Information Security Program was established in July 2017 to enhance and protect the Information Service and Technology's cybersecurity ecosystem; and
- WHEREAS, the Federal Government of the United States of America, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (www.cisa.gov), the Multi-State Information Sharing and Analysis Center (https://www.cisecurity.org/msisac), the National Association of State Chief Information Officers (www.nascio.org), and the National Cyber Security Alliance (www.staysafeonline.org) all recognize October as National Cybersecurity Awareness Month; and all citizens are encouraged to

visit these websites, and the STOP. THINK. CONNECT.<sup>TM</sup> Campaign website (www.cisa.gov/stopthinkconnect or www.stopthinkconnect.org) to learn about cybersecurity to put that knowledge into practice in their homes, schools, workplaces, and businesses.

## <u>22-0564 Proclamation – Minority Enterprise Development Week October 3-7, 2022</u>

Commissioner Burns read the following proclamation:

#### MINORITY ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT WEEK | 2022

- **WHEREAS,** it is the policy of the County of Durham that purchasing by the County and contracts with the County be open to all people and be free of discrimination on the basis of race and gender; and
- **WHEREAS,** diverse entrepreneurship encourages progress toward innovative solutions to the problem of economic growth, and supports the promise of thriving communities that embrace inclusion and a better life for all families; and
- **WHEREAS,** the Durham County Minority and Women Enterprise Ordinance Section 8-132 provides minorities and women equal opportunity to participate in all aspects of the County's contracting program, including, but not limited to, employment, construction projects, and/or materials and service contracts, consistent with law; and
- **WHEREAS,** G.S. 143-128, provides for Good Faith Efforts to be made in an effort to ensure fair participation of minority and women business owners in all County projects; and
- WHEREAS according to the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research, the impacts of the Covid 19 have contributed to a staggering 41 percent drop in African American business owners, 32 percent decline in Latinx business owners, 26 percent in Asian business owners and a 25 percent reduction in women owned businesses nationwide, and
- **WHEREAS,** it is further the policy of the County to conduct its contracting programs so as to prevent such discrimination, correct present discrimination and to resolve claims of such discrimination; and
- WHEREAS, the County of Durham is a sponsor of the Minority Enterprise Development Week; and

WHEREAS, During Minority Enterprise Development Week, we recognize that our County and our economy are stronger because of the hardworking men and women who comprise America's minority business community. They consistently demonstrate the courage it takes to overcome adversity, seize opportunity, and contribute to our shared prosperity.

Keisha Davis, Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprise (MWBE) thanked the Board for the proclamation and stated Durham's Minority Enterprise Development Week started with a free event collaborated with the City of Durham tailored for small and minority-owned businesses on Monday, October 3<sup>rd</sup> from 9 a.m. to Noon at Durham City Hall.

The Board thanked Ms. Davis for her continued support for the Durham County MWBE Program. The Board inquired about Ms. Davis winning an award in 2021. Ms. Davis responded she won the 2021 Diversity Advocate of the Year Award. The Board asked how residents could find more information about the events during the Minority Enterprise Development Week. Ms. Davis replied, the City and County website and social media outlets.

#### 22-0579 Introduction of New City-County and Refugee Affairs Coordinator

Donna Rewalt, County Extension Director introduced Kakou Nayo, City-County Immigrant and Refugee Affairs Coordinator and shared Mr. Nayo joined Durham County in August 2022. She added his previous work experience and knowledge on refugee and immigrant issues in Durham would help him facilitate successful integration of immigrants and refugees into the community.

Mr. Nayo stated he was excited about the new experience and thanked the Board for the opportunity to join Durham County to connect resources to immigrants and refugees in Durham.

The Board thanked Mr. Nayo for serving both the City of Durham and Durham County in an important role and looked forward to working with Mr. Nayo on addressing initiatives and practices to assist immigrants and refugees in Durham.

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#### **Additional Announcement**

Gudrun Parmer, Interim General Manger stated Governor Roy Cooper declared a State of Emergency in advance of Hurricane Ian's remnants moving through the state and introduced Nathan Sanders, Senior

Emergency Management Coordinator. Mr. Sanders shared an update on Hurricane Ian and the predicated forecast. He added the State of Emergency would waive transportation rules to help transport fuel and critical supplies, help first responders and the agricultural industry as well as protect consumers from price gouging.

The Board asked if Durham County made any request for the State of Emergency. Mr. Sanders replied, a white flag request for citizens without housing was made.

### **Public Hearings**

# 22-0542 Second Public Hearing and Resolution Regarding Durham County's Application for CDBG Neighborhood Revitalization Funds

Drew Cummings, Chief of Staff introduced Anna Blanchard, Senior Planner for Triangle J Council of Governments. Ms. Blanchard stated the purpose of the public hearing was to communicate and receive feedback on a proposed plan of work if Durham County received the grant.

Chair Howerton opened the public hearing.

Ms. Blanchard shared the *NC Neighborhood Revitalization Program (CDBG) Durham County Application* which highlighted the following: Overview, NC Neighborhood Revitalization Program, Eligible Activities, Additional Requirements, Determination of Needs, Application Overview, Partnership, Project Administration, Public Input Opportunities and Next Steps.

No citizens were signed up to speak.

Chair Howerton closed the public hearing

The Board inquired about loan forgiveness. Ms. Blanchard replied, the loans would have zero percent interest rates and could be forgivable at five to ten thousand dollars per year. She added the program was setup to prevent homeowners from getting homes rehabbed and sold for a profit. The Board asked about loan defaults. Ms. Blanchard responded no loan default occurred with the program.

The Board thanked Ms. Blanchard and Mr. Cummings for providing the home rehabilitation program for Durham residents.

#### **Other Business**

# 22-0563 Railroad Crossing Elimination Grant Application for Plum Street, Driver Street, and Ellis Road

Ellen Beckmann, Durham County Transportation Manager shared the *Railroad Crossing Elimination Grant Application* which highlighted the following: Durham Rail-Crossing Engagement, Planning, and Innovative Revitalization (Durham REPAIR) Project, Project Goals, Safety, Connectivity, Reliable Access for East Durham and Position Project for State and Federal Construction Funding.

The Board asked if the study would forecast how the project would impact surrounding communities and businesses. Ms. Beckmann responded the City-County Planning and Environmental Services would research how the project would impact surrounding communities and businesses. The Board asked if the County should wait for the City to approve the project first. Ms. Beckmann replied two of the three roads were in the City and the Memorandum of Understanding could be setup with the City.

The Board asked how the study would coincide with future transportation projects and if additional support would be needed if a large federal transportation grant was secured. Ms. Beckmann responded the project would allow more flexibility and choices for future transportation projects; adding she was comfortable managing the grant and would partner with the NC Department of Transportation Railroad for engineering assistance.

Commissioner Allam moved, seconded by Commissioner Carter to authorize the Chair to sign a letter of support for the grant application.

The motion carried unanimously.

## 22-0543 Impact and Recovery of Durham's Hospitality Sector and Durham Sports Commission Annual Update

Susan Amey, Discovery Durham President and Chief Executive Officer shared the *Tourism Impact and Recovery* which highlighted the following: Who We Are, Rediscover Durham, Viral Social Videos (FY'21-22), Direct Visitor Spending \$778 Million, Visitor Spending by Sector, Direct Tourism Employment: 5700 Jobs, No Sector has Matched the Leisure and Hospitality Wage Increases, State and Local Impact, Total Lodging Revenue Forecast, 'Rediscover Durham' Campaign Fall 2021, 'Hightail it to Durham' Campaign Spring 2022, National and Regional Public Relation Hits, Expanding Content Channels, Representation in Marketing and Durham Convention and Arts Complex.

Marcus Manning, Executive Director, Durham Sports Commission shared the *Durham Sports Commission* which highlighted the following: Durham Sports Commission (DSC) Pillars, DSC Three-Year Event Data FY20-FY22, FY"22 Overview, Funding Sources FY20 Versus FY22, World University Games 2027, Champion Durham Classic, One Team, One Durham Fund Launch, Durham Sports Complex, Parents' Desired Outcomes for Their Child Playing Sports and A Bull City Transformation.

The Board suggested community partners be involved with the sports complex, research the external cost included with the use of a sports complex, a major sponsor for the sports complex and the environmental impacts of a sports complex. The Board inquired about the location of the sports complex with land becoming scarce in Durham. Mr. Manning replied the DSC was scouting for land and working with partners to find potential land for the sports complex.

The Board thanked Ms. Amey and Mr. Manning for their presentations and dedicated work to Discovery Durham and Durham Sports Commission.

## 22-0512 Durham County Public Health Focused Update on the COVID-19 Crisis

Rodney Jenkins, Public Health Director shared the *COVID-19/Monkeypox Updates* which highlighted the following: Current COVID-19 Statistics, Current Race and Ethnicity Trends, COVID-19 Percent Positive Labs, Usage and Capacity Hospitalization Data, COVID-19 Community Level, Free COVID-19 Testing, Free COVID-19 At-Home Tests, COVID Vaccine Updates, Vaccine Recommendations, Monkeypox Background and Monkeypox vaccinations, Flu Vaccine Recommendations and Final Thoughts.

The Board asked if the 90,000 cases included residents testing positive for COVID multiple times. Mr. Jenkins responded yes, adding each time a resident tested positive it was considered a new case. The Board inquired about the monkeypox vaccination and questioned recommendations for travel and large conference events. Mr. Jenkins replied the monkeypox vaccination was two doses with the second dose

taken one month after the first dose. With regards to traveling or attending large conferences, Mr. Jenkins recommended being precautionary and to always wear a mask.
